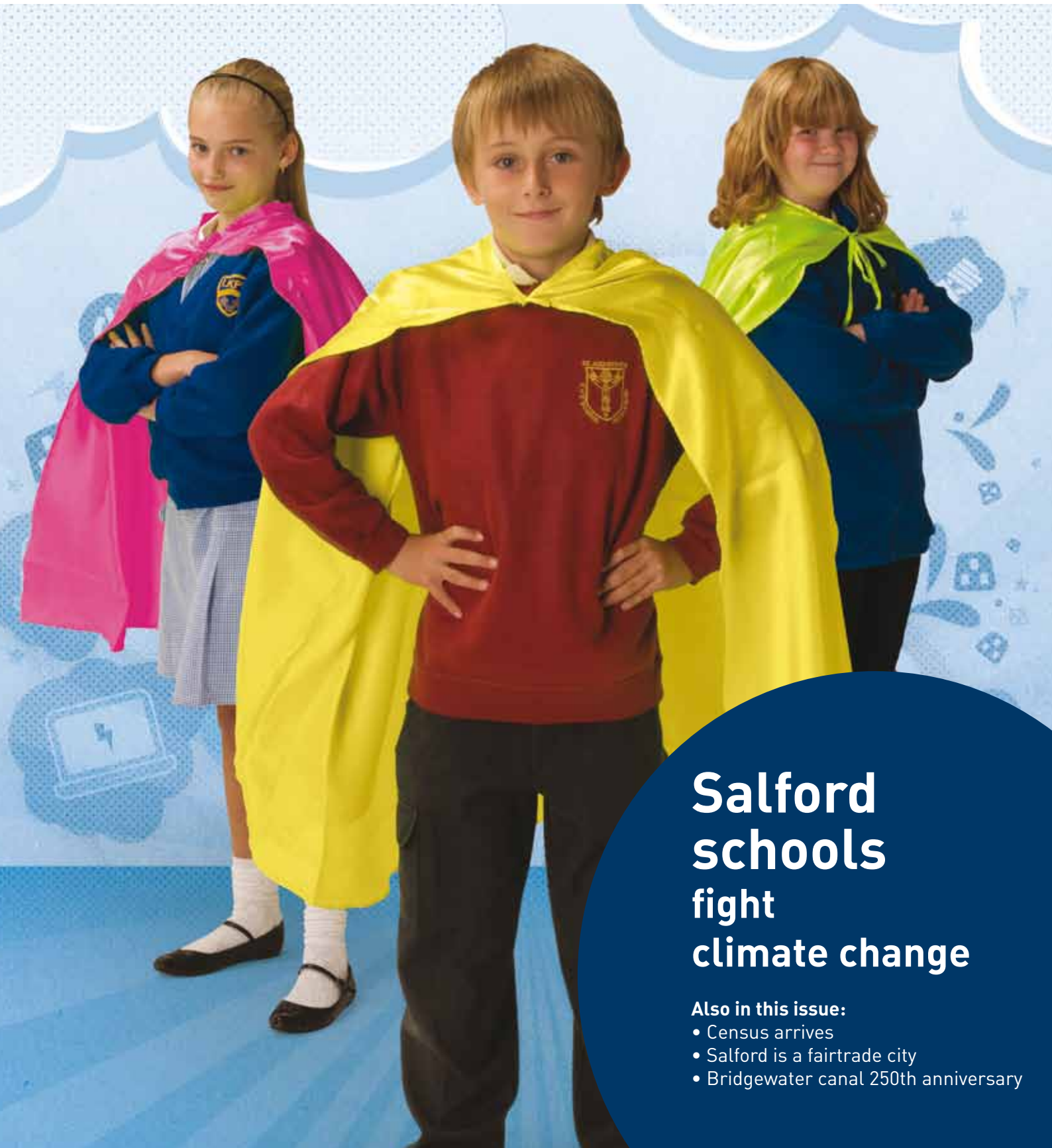

Groundbreaking at Salford Greengate

Work has begun to transform a run down area of Salford. The Greengate development will bring between £400 million and £450 million of investment into Salford and create 4,500 jobs. It is being built at the site of the former Manchester Exchange station, which is now a car park.

The project is being delivered by Salford City Council and is the result of a partnership between Central Salford Urban Regeneration Company (CSURC), Northwest Development Agency and the European Regional Development Fund.

The first phase of the project including a public space, a footbridge linking the development to Manchester, water fountains and architectural sculptures is expected to be completed by April 2012.

A ground breaking ceremony with Council leader, John Merry, and Salford MP Hazel Blears was held in January.

Speaking at the ceremony, Councillor John Merry said: "The redevelopment of this site will really unlock its potential. Over the past ten years Salford has been transformed as a result of significant investment.

As we face tough economic times, it is essential we continue to harness the momentum that has built up in Salford to ensure the city and the people living here, continue to thrive. This development will bring more investment and further boost the local economy."

Illegal alcohol and cigarettes seized

More than 250 bottles of illegal alcohol and 690 cigarettes have been seized from pubs and off-licences in Salford.

Salford City Council's Trading Standards officers found the goods during inspections at 25 pubs and 28 off-licences. Of the premises they visited, four pubs and eight off-licences were selling non-duty paid wine and spirits, all brought into the country illegally.

Around 690 illicit cigarettes from overseas were also taken from one off-licence after officers discovered they were suspected of being smuggled into the country.

The inspections were supported by HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and the Foods Standards Agency.

Councillor Joe Murphy, Salford City Council's lead member for environment said: "Fake alcohol and cigarettes can pose serious health risks to the public and we have a duty not just to protect people's wellbeing but also their pockets from counterfeit goods.

This is a serious matter and premises that offend will be dealt with which may result in their licences being taken away."

Graham Forbes, HMRC special investigations manager said: "Smugglers and counterfeiters cheat the country of revenue vital to funding public services like hospitals and schools. This illicit trade also has a devastating impact on honest retailers."

New year hope

Stewart McKie is looking forward to the year ahead and spending more time with his six year old son, something which he never thought possible a couple of years ago when he was sleeping rough in Salford.

Stewart celebrated this Christmas with a new job and a place to live after being supported by Salford City Council, the Salvation Army and its housing association (SAHA).

Said Stewart. "Without the hostel and the help I received there, I wouldn't be where I am today. When you are sleeping on the streets you have really hit rock bottom and it's hard to see a way out of your situation."

Through an innovative partnership between the council, the SAHA and construction

partners, Stewart was able to complete an NVQ in construction at Salford City College and pass exams that made him ready for work.

The St James Street hostel where Stewart originally stayed is soon to be replaced by a new purpose built supported housing scheme in Brindle Heath.

The new Places of Change centre will provide accommodation for 20 single homeless men and is a joint project by the council and the Salvation Army Housing Association, with funding from the Homes and Communities Agency.

Council budget update

The consultation process for the 2011-2012 budget is continuing, with an announcement due to be made at the end of February.

This is slightly later than was initially forecast to give councillors the opportunity to deliver the best possible budget for the city.

The council needs to make between £40 million and £47 million of savings in the next financial year and the priority is to minimise the impact on frontline services.

Councillor John Merry CBE, Leader of Salford City Council, said: "Since the budget settlement was announced we have been working hard to find areas for saving that will have minimal impact on our frontline services.

Losing further grants on top of the reduced budget settlement has hit Salford particularly hard but we are doing all we can to protect our most vulnerable residents.

When we have full details of where the savings will be made, we will provide information to local people via the council's website and directly to households."

New housing service standards

Landlords in Salford have pledged to improve services for tenants with a new set of standards.

The plans, approved by Salford City Council, cover more than 30,000 homes in the city and will see Salix Homes, Great Places Housing Group, City West Housing Trust, Contour Homes and Irwell Valley work together to provide consistent levels of services to residents.

The standards cover customer service, more support for victims of antisocial behaviour, joint community events and support for local labour and

suppliers. Residents will also be able to take part in regular estate inspections to feedback on local issues.

The standards have been introduced following residents' feedback to Salford City Council and the housing partners and cover three key areas; customer service, neighbourhood pride and antisocial behaviour.

The standards say that partners should aim to:

- complete repairs on the first visit
- respond to complaints within ten working days and ensure staff are appropriately trained
- give residents a say on improving services
- respond to serious reports within 24 hours
- provide residents with a named person as a key contact

Councillor Peter Connor, Salford City Council's lead member for housing said: "We've developed these standards after listening to what residents have to say on these services."

Salford schools fight climate change

As part of the council's drive to reduce the city's carbon emissions, an internal campaign to switch off electrical equipment when not in use is being extended to encourage Salford schools to reduce the amount of energy that they use. Surprisingly, over 30% of the council's energy usage can be attributed to school buildings, so it's important that all schools across the city are as energy efficient as possible.

Managing and reducing energy use can have significant benefits for a school. Encouraging everyone to take small actions, such as switching off lights and equipment when not in use, can have a big impact on energy use. Turning off taps, reusing items and generally being less

wasteful with materials will also save energy. The great advantage of improving energy standards throughout a school is not only that it reduces carbon emissions, it can also save money too.

Schools are crucial in shaping the attitudes and behaviours of young people towards the environment. Many schools in Salford are already taking active measures to reduce their environmental impact and educate their pupils on green issues. Activities in schools can contribute to action in the wider community as young people are encouraged to save energy, both at school and when they return home.

The international Eco-Schools award programme has been found to be a great way to

integrate environmental issues into the curriculum and create an environmental ethos throughout the school.

Pupils are the driving force behind Eco-Schools, not the teachers. The children lead the eco-committee and help assess the environmental performance of their school. Through consultation with the rest of the school and the wider community, they decide which environmental themes to address.

The programme covers areas such as energy use, transport, recycling, biodiversity, improving school grounds and healthy living. Schools work towards achieving a bronze, silver or green flag award status for their environmental efforts.

Impressively, 76% of all schools in Salford are already taking part in the Eco-Schools programme.

To support Eco-School activities Salford City Council is launching a campaign during climate week (21-27 March). The fun posters featuring pupils from Salford's Eco-Schools encourage children and staff to switch off lights, computers and other electrical equipment when not being used. As part of the initiative, the council is inviting all schools in Salford to run their very own energy saving campaigns and enter into a competition to find the best schools energy campaign.

Lights off!

Two years ago the Cathedral School of St Peter and St John RC Primary School was experiencing problems when it came to energy. Pupils were already looking at how they could help the environment as part of the Eco-School award and decided to take action.

Classes were assigned a light monitor, responsible for switching the lights off when everyone left the class room; a rota system ensured that everyone had a chance to help. The school's Green Team' toured the school

at dinner time to carry out classroom checks. If anything was left on then they would leave a note on the door with an explanation of what the class needed to improve on. Results were kept on a score sheet and every week the best performing class received a certificate

Schemes like this work brilliantly to change pupils and teachers behaviour in school. The school's energy rating has also increased since they started the project and all the work contributed to them becoming a green flag Eco-School.



Need to borrow money?

Loans, overdrafts, credit cards, store cards, catalogues and buying on credit (furniture for example) are all forms of borrowing money and will cost you different amounts. If you need to borrow money it's important to understand how much you will be paying back to make sure you'll be able to afford the repayments.

Before borrowing think about:

- How much you can afford to repay. The Financial Services Authority budget calculator can help you do this. www.moneymadeclear.org.uk/budget_planner
- How much the total is that you will have to repay.
- How long you will be paying back the money. It's not a good idea to still be paying for a debt that lasts longer than the product you bought.
- If the debt is to be used to pay off other debts or will be secured on your home, get advice first.
- Comparing the cost of different types of credit available. Annual Percentage Rate (APR) is an important way of helping you do this. Generally the higher the APR, the more it will cost. APR doesn't just include interest, but also setting up charges and associated costs.

Other factors

Spreading the loan over a longer period of time will mean it costs more in the end but can make it easier for you to make the repayments.

Look closely at other costs including initial fees and charges for missing payments. Also, think before agreeing to insurance. Be clear about what is covered, if you need it and how much it will cost over the lifetime of the loan.

Make sure the loan company has explained how much money you will end up paying back in total, including the original amount and compare with your other options.

Lower cost loans

River Valley Credit Union and Moneyline Greater Manchester can provide affordable loans to residents. Credit Unions are owned and controlled by their members (including you if you join) and do

not exist to make a profit. You will need to open an account and start to make some savings before you are eligible to borrow money. The amount you can borrow is up to twice the amount you have saved.

When a loan shark is successfully prosecuted all the debts are wiped out and money they have made is given back to the community they have taken from.

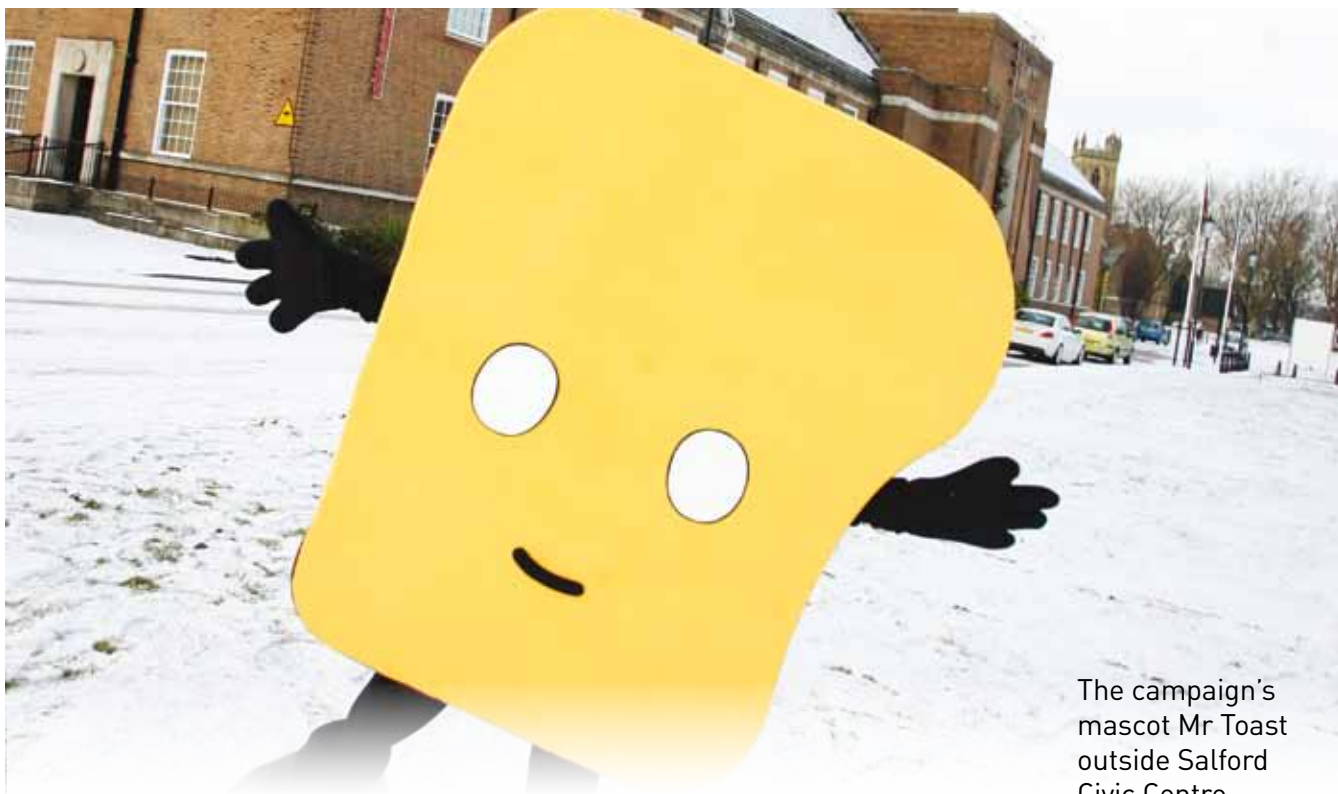

Banish those winter chills and get your home insulated

The 'Toasty Manchester' campaign, organised by the Energy Saving Trust and ten Greater Manchester councils, is aiming to insulate 4,500 homes across Greater Manchester this winter.

Loft and cavity wall insulation is like wrapping up your home in a big blanket. And because of the extra warmth you're keeping in the house, you can turn your heating down and save around £255 per year on your energy bills. Not only that but rooms with insulated walls warm up more quickly and there is less chance of damp and condensation forming.

It's cheaper than you think to insulate your home. Grants are available and some people may be eligible for free insulation. If you have to pay, you could get your home insulated for as little as £99 (subject to survey).

In addition to the financial incentives, the region's new 'toasty' warm houses will help lower the carbon footprint of Greater Manchester as we strive to become a low carbon economic area. At present 34% of Greater Manchester's carbon emissions come from housing.

Do I qualify for free insulation?

You can currently get FREE loft and cavity wall insulation if you are a homeowner and fall into one of the groups below:

- aged over 70 or
- receive specific benefits, credits or allowances

If you are a homeowner you can book a free, no obligation survey online at www.getmetoasty.com or by calling **0800 512 012**. An accredited installer will come out and have a look at what you need.

Bridgewater Canal

250th Anniversary

Salford's most historic and famous waterway, The Bridgewater Canal flows peacefully through the city, but has a fascinating and surprising story to tell.

Three men - the Duke of Bridgewater, John Gilbert and James Brindley - worked together to make the dream of the canal a reality. Constructed in 1759 and opened in 1761, the canal was at the heart of industry in the area, transporting coal via boats from the underground mines to Manchester and beyond. This was the beginning of the transport revolution, the catalyst for the Industrial Revolution that changed the face of life in England.

The canal was used for leisure as well as industry with passenger services starting in 1769 and by 1781 there was a daily service between Manchester and Worsley. The canal itself was also famous as the location for the first trials of boats powered by steam, the forerunners of the mighty paddle



steamers that still navigate the Mississippi River in the USA today.

In its heyday the canal carried more than 3 million tonnes of traffic; today it forms part of the popular boat cruising route known as the Cheshire Ring. The Bridgewater connects with the Trent and Mersey Canal at Preston Brook, Leeds and Liverpool Canal at Leigh, The Rochdale Canal and The Manchester Ship Canal.

To celebrate the 250th anniversary of this remarkable feat of engineering, there will be a number of commemorative events taking place both on and off the water throughout the year. There will also be live music,

arts projects, re-enaction and much more besides to mark this momentous anniversary.

Census 2011 coming to a letterbox near you...

In March 2011 all residential households in the UK will be taking part in a census. The census provides an excellent source of information about the population. A full and accurate count is critical to Salford as the figures produced form the basis for funding from Central Government for the city. Funding is allocated based on census returns for services such as schools, housing, transport and health services.

Help completing your form

You can complete the census online, or post the paper questionnaire back (the postage is pre-paid). It's straightforward to complete, but if you have any difficulties with it, you can ask for a census collector to come along to offer help and/or collect your questionnaire. To request a visit, simply call the **census helpline (available from 4 March) 0300 0201 101**. A census collector will then telephone you to arrange the best time to visit. Salford's Community Safety team recommend you ask anyone calling at your door for official photo identification. If in doubt, request any caller to return at a later date and speak with the company to confirm their identification.

Alternatively you can visit one on the local support events where you will receive assistance from the census team. For event information see the cut out and keep box on the opposite page.

A broad and innovative range of accessible formats will help large numbers of people with sight, hearing, literacy, language and other difficulties to complete their census questionnaire independently. The census website, www.census.gov.uk is BrowseAloud (text-to-speech) enabled, so that web pages can be read aloud. There's the option to change the size of the text and the colour contrast and to download British Sign Language video and audio guides.

Census history

Governments of every era have recognised the need to collect information on their most valuable asset - their people. The Babylonians and the Chinese



held censuses mainly for military and taxation purposes. The Egyptians collected information on the population so that they could plan armies of people to build the pyramids and to redistribute land following the annual flooding of the Nile. The Greeks and Romans were also keen census takers.

The first thorough survey of England was in 1086 when William the Conqueror ordered the production of the Domesday Book. This detailed inventory of land and property was a massive undertaking at the time. It took many years to complete and provides us with a remarkable picture of life in Norman Britain.

In 1798 a demographer called Thomas Malthus caused great concern by suggesting that population growth would soon outstrip supplies of food and other resources. Unable to support itself, Britain would be hit by famine, disease and other disasters. Concerned at this alarmist view of the

future, people began to see the need for a census. Parliament passed the Census Act in 1800 and the first official census of England and Wales was on 10 March 1801. Since 1801 there has been a census every ten years except in 1941, during the Second World War. The basic principles of census taking remain the same, though new questions have been added and others have been omitted.

Did you know?

- 1 The first census of Great Britain was in 1801 revealing a total population count for England and Wales of 9.3 million. By 2001, the population had grown to over 52 million.
- 2 The census is confidential and protected by law until 2111. The answers you give are turned into numbers by statisticians and then fed into decision making processes
- 3 For the first time ever in 2011, you can fill the census in online.

- 4 Completing the census is a legal requirement. Anyone who refuses to complete the census may be fined up to £1,000 and acquire a criminal record.
- 5 Getting the 2011 Census questionnaire printed is a project of epic proportions. Millions have been printed to help count all the people of England and Wales. The printing rate is nothing short of spectacular. It has taken just 0.125 seconds to print, cut, collate, staple, fold and trim each questionnaire. That's eight every second.
