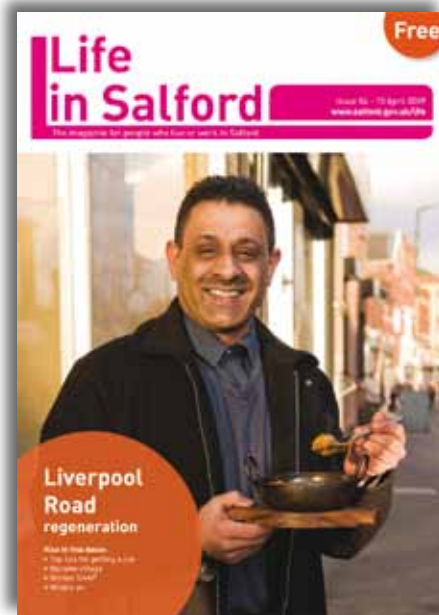

Reducing re-offending

In April, Salford starts a two year pilot scheme introducing new community orders. The new Intensive Alternative to Custody provides an alternative to jail for young men who would have received a sentence of less than 12 months.

The orders aim to tackle re-offending, which is highest amongst 18-25 year old male offenders with short sentences. The orders can last up to 12 months and will involve up to 30 hours a week of concentrated and challenging activity including rehabilitation and punishment. The offender will be subject to a curfew, be closely supervised and monitored which will include regular court reviews. The penalties for non-compliance will be swift and severe.

Mentors will work alongside the Probation Service to provide encouragement and support the aim of reducing re-offending. A strong emphasis throughout the order will be given to working towards employment.

Council a star performer

Residents in Salford are getting good value for their council tax and being offered services that continue to improve...

That is the verdict of the local government watchdog, the Audit Commission, which rates how well town halls serve communities.

Salford City Council's performance earned it three out of a maximum four stars, and confirmation that it was "improving well".

The report said that the council has made improvements in many areas including providing better housing and reducing crime.

It also noted that pupils are achieving their best ever GCSE results and that the council is doing a lot in supporting local people into employment.

The report also highlighted that underperformance is being dealt with proactively and that this has led to signs of improvement in children's services.

Council leader Councillor John Merry said: "To pass this tough annual test we have to deliver quality services across the board every day and I am delighted that we have been able to consolidate our past performance.

We compare well with other authorities but I am not complacent and I can see there is still more we can do to improve performance still further."

SNAP response in Winton

The first week in February saw Salford's very first SNAP taking place in Winton. With a week of activity tackling specific issues in the area, here's what happened...

Policing

The police started the week by carrying out seven drugs warrants, resulting in arrests. One address was found to contain at least 200 cannabis plants. Working with the DVLA, the police removed eight untaxed and uninsured vehicles.

A mobile police station operated a public drop-in service offering crime reduction advice and giving residents the opportunity to meet local police officers.

Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) were also out in the area helping to make homes safer by offering free forensic DNA property marking kits (see photo). The new system puts a unique mark on household valuables that protects homes by linking criminals to the crime scene and property to its rightful owner. The system also acts as a powerful deterrent for criminals, as once applied it is almost impossible to remove. Thieves know this system can conclusively prove their guilt if stolen items are recovered.

During the coming months SNAPs will also take place in Broughton, Langworthy, Irwell Riverside, Ordsall and Little Hulton.

The next SNAP takes place in Langworthy from 27 April to 3 May 2009.

Anti-social behaviour

One key area of SNAP activity involved cracking down on anti-social behaviour and included the removal of graffiti, installation of alley gates and the removal of rubbish. The installation of alley gates to the rear of Sutherland Street was a resounding success. One resident told us: "It has been used as an escape route for hooligans for many years. Closing off the escape route will make it easier to police. In addition it will provide peace of mind to many residents."

Children and young people

Part of the SNAP week was the challenge of raising young people's awareness of issues such as crime and health through education programmes, drop-in sessions and events. Salford City Reds delivered healthy living assemblies in three primary schools across Winton to encourage pupils to take part in sports and team activities. Youth workers held sessions for young people in the area covering topics such as drugs, alcohol, sexual health awareness, healthy eating, and stopping smoking.

Environmental improvements

The refuse team collected a massive 17.5 tonnes of bulky items from properties in the area, including 22 fridges and fridge freezers, 56 television sets, 15 personal computers and 12 washing machines. Specialists were also on hand to advise residents what can and cannot be recycled in the new bins.



Fire safety

Greater Manchester Fire & Rescue Service adopted a targeted approach to carrying out over 230 Home Fire Risk Assessments, focusing on vulnerable residents and areas of highest risk. Work has continued beyond the SNAP week to educate residents about fire safety and prevention.

A local resident said "I knew nothing about fire safety until I had my risk assessment but I now know more about fire prevention and the hazards involved."

5 minutes with...

Richard Abernethy

Liverpool Road resident Richard Abernethy plays an active role in his neighbourhood, sitting on his local community committee and helping organise the annual Irlam and Cadishead Festival. We talked to him about his local activities.

Q. How long have you been involved in the Irlam and Cadishead area?

I've lived in Salford since 1967 and on Liverpool Road, Cadishead since the early 1970s. I've been involved in local community work and projects in the area for over 30 years.

Q. What made you decide to get involved in your community?

My involvement grew out of my interests in natural history and the environment. I started out by taking an adult education class and from there I got involved in wider community groups. I helped set up a natural history group in the area which led to a few of

us setting up an environmental improvement group called Irlam and Cadishead Accord. This group carried out a number of projects, particularly around the Old River

area. As a representative of Accord, I attended the first ever community committee meeting in the early 90s when I was elected as chair, a position I held until 2004.

Q. Which community project are you most proud of?

I am very proud of working with local environmental groups to create several new woodland sites in Irlam and Cadishead.

I was also proud of what we managed to achieve with the community committee, in

particular the appointment of a new ranger and a community arts officer. The Neighbourhood Management team really worked hard and made things happen.

This has been one of the things I've enjoyed most: meeting people who can make your ideas a reality.

Q. What have you been involved in recently?

In recent years, I have devoted my time to the Irlam and Cadishead Festival Committee. Each year, around 5,000 people or more enjoy the event. The festival has brought international-level street theatre of an incredibly high quality to the area – again, something of which I am very proud.

Events like this raise the area's profile, rebuild community spirit, help raise money and let people know what is going on in their local community.

The future of Liverpool Road

Prince's Park Garden Centre is an established part of the community, providing training and employment for adults with disabilities. The centre and its staff were involved in the recent In Bloom projects along Liverpool Road.



There has been a buzz about the regeneration of Central Salford for some time but there are now firm plans to regenerate the west of the city as well.

A plan now sets out an ambitious vision for the area developed through a series of consultations in 2006-7 with local communities, agencies, elected members and businesses. There is a real passion from all those involved to revitalise town centres and neighbourhoods, improve transport links and to make the most of local economic, leisure and heritage opportunities.

The vision is:

“In 2028 Salford West will be one of the most desirable and prosperous areas in Greater Manchester.”

One of the priority areas in the plan is the improvement of Liverpool Road and work is already underway to make a positive difference. Liverpool Road is a major route through Irlam, Cadishead and Eccles and has historically been an important link between Warrington and Manchester. The road in the past has been a busy thoroughfare packed with shops, industry and residential properties. The problems suffered by small retailers in recent times have been reflected in the decline of some areas. Yet for many people travelling through it every day, Liverpool Road is still their view of Salford.

Liverpool Road's past

The area has a trail-blazing history linked to the industrial revolution starting with the Bridgewater Canal (which can be found going under Liverpool Road), which was commissioned by the Duke of Bridgewater and completed in 1761 (find out more on p12).

Also that year, James Brindley completed the nearby “canal in the air”, the Barton Aqueduct. It is said that on the morning the aqueduct opened, Brindley so feared it would not work that he stayed in his bed at the local inn. He need not have worried and he justly went on to become one of the foremost engineers of his time.

Industry grew rapidly in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, including the creation of the steelworks which was a major source of employment until it closed in 1979.



At the local Theatre Organ Heritage Centre a big thrill is available for enthusiasts of cinema, theatre and theatre organs. Three Wurlitzer organs have been saved and the centre can be booked by clubs and societies. Information can be found at www.ttot.org.uk.

Much of the landscape of Chat Moss reflects its agricultural past and present, with extensive cultivation supplying produce to markets across the North West. The area, along with Prince's Park, Cadishead Park and Eccles Recreation Park, is also important in providing a substantial part of the green lungs of the city.

Liverpool Road today

In 2007 the council asked local residents and business what improvements they wanted to see along Liverpool Road and the top priorities were:

- better roads and pavements
- a safe and pleasant environment
- more support for local business
- improvement to parking and public transport
- employment for local people.

These priorities have been included in the Liverpool Road Corridor Strategy, a ten year plan which says how the council and its partners will make the area a more vibrant and well connected place to live and work.

Improvements can already be seen with new flower displays brightening up the area, including the beautiful barrier basket displays over Patricroft Bridge.

Over the next couple of months you will see people busy at work in Cadishead and Patricroft Neighbourhood Centres as part of a shop front improvement programme for properties in most need of work. This will revitalise shopping areas, building on previous grants which have benefitted businesses such as the Balti Brasserie (front cover).

We will be consulting with local people and businesses in summer 2009 about plans to improve public areas in these centres. Work could include pavement improvements, new parking areas, cycle lanes, new planting or street furniture.

Highway and footpath resurfacing will also take place between New Moss Road and Fir Street, Cadishead in spring 2009.

Building business confidence



Salford City Council has established a partnership with Bovis Lend Lease to give local construction companies a chance to tender for work on any of Bovis' projects, including MediaCityUK.

In addition to construction opportunities with the council, Salford-based companies can now apply to become part of Bovis' supply chain so that they can be considered when work on the different sites comes up.

To apply, local companies need to complete a Building Confidence application so that they can be assessed on the level of work their business is capable of, as well as compliance on criteria such as health and safety and corporate responsibility.

At a time when many local businesses are falling victim to the current economic downturn and struggling to find work, the project will boost local employment.

Already over £225 million worth of contracts have been awarded to companies involved at MediaCityUK with £36 million awarded to Salford contractors.

Workshops on the project have attracted over 50 local businesses. Local building company Freemont R&R has already been through the process and knows the importance and benefits such partnership projects have on smaller companies in Salford. It is currently working at MediaCityUK, where Bovis Lend Lease is the management contractor.

Worsley village -

A clock that strikes 13, revolutions, 52 miles of underground canals, steam boats and early Victorian architecture...

Looking around Worsley village today, with its picturesque green, half-timbered houses and tranquil canalside setting, it is difficult to imagine that this was once the birthplace of the 'transport' revolution in the 18th century.

The building of the Bridgewater Canal in 1761 linked coal mines in Worsley with Manchester city centre and halved the price of coal overnight. This fuelled the industrial revolution that changed the face of British history forever. There are many remnants of this industrious past still visible today as you take a walk around the village.



Bridgewater Canal and The Delph

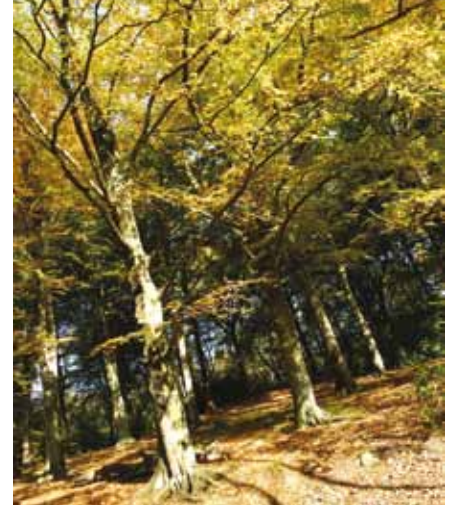
Three men - the Duke of Bridgewater, John Gilbert and James Brindley - worked together to make the dream a reality. Work started on the construction of the canal in 1759 and it opened for business in 1761.

The Delph marks the entrance to the underground canal system which transported the coal to the surface canal. Some 52 miles of underground canals exist stretching as far as Farnborough. A million tons of coal a year passed through the underground canals until 1887 when new deeper mines and colliery railways made the canal redundant.

The canal itself was also famous as the location for the first trials of boats powered by steam - the forerunners of the mighty paddle steamers that still navigate the Mississippi river today.

Worsley Green

The picturesque area of the green is not, as many people might think, a traditional village green. Until c.1903 it was Worsley Yard, the centre of an industrial complex that included a boat building yard, motor mill, timber yard, nail makers, wheelwrights, basketmakers and a warehouse. It is still possible to see the



imprints in the grass where railway sidings ran. The yard also boasted an unusual clock that struck 13 at 1 o'clock. The Duke of Bridgewater wanted to know why the workmen were late back from their lunch break. On being told they had difficulty hearing the clock strike one because of the noise of the yard, the Duke promptly had the mechanism adjusted so it struck 13! The clock was preserved and later installed in St Mark's Church where it still resides today.

On the green you will also find Worsley's only monument to Francis, 3rd Duke of Bridgewater, 'The Canal Duke'. This was constructed from the base of the Works Yard chimney.

Packet House

The Grade II listed Packet House and the Boat Steps in front of it date back to 1760, with the distinctive half-timbering added by the 1st Earl of Ellesmere in 1850. Passenger services ran along the canal from 1769 and by 1781 there was a daily service running between Manchester and Worsley. Tickets would have been purchased for the 'packet boat' at the Packet House and boarded at

the Boat Steps directly in front of the house.

Court House

This Grade II listed building was built in 1840 for the 1st Earl of Ellesmere to house the manorial court of Worsley. The site has a history of justice of a different kind as it was previously infamous as the site of the village stocks!

Alphabet Bridge

The original bridge was so christened by pupils from St Mark's School who used the bridge daily and practised their alphabet on the 26 planks that made up the span. There are still 26 planks today so keep up the tradition as you cross!

Worsley Woods

Worsley also boasts some beautiful woodland to explore. Worsley Woods includes peaceful walks along the old looplins (disused railway lines), the Old Warke Dam and the impressive Aviary, built in 1850 as a shooting and fishing lodge. Worsley Woods was declared a Local Nature Reserve in 2006 and is home to a wide variety of beautiful wildflowers and wildlife. You can download a copy of the Worsley Woods wildflower trail by going to www.visitsalford.info/worsleywoods or why not go a step further and join the Worsley Woodlands Action Group? This volunteer group meets regularly for conservation tasks - contact the ranger team on 793 4219 to find out more.

Heritage trails

A CV is a short list of facts about you, your work history, skills and experience. A good CV is essential and should enable you to stand out from the crowd.

Look beyond the obvious

There are a number of places where you can search for jobs, such as:

- on websites dedicated to advertising job vacancies
- by registering with recruitment agencies who can look for jobs on your behalf
- asking family or friends if they know of any vacancies.

Check your application

When you have found an appropriate job to apply for, it is important that your application makes a good impression, is factually correct and in plain English.

Be prepared

Being invited to an interview means your application must have made a good impression. You need to research the company you have applied to and practice answering interview questions.

The pledge

The police service in England and Wales will support law abiding citizens and pursue criminals relentlessly to keep you and your neighbourhoods safe from harm.

We will:

1. Always treat you fairly with dignity and respect ensuring you have fair access to our services at a time that is reasonable and suitable for you.
 2. Provide you with information so you know who your dedicated Neighbourhood Policing Team is, where they are based, how to contact them and how to work with them.
 3. Ensure your Neighbourhood Policing Team and other police patrols are visible and on your patch at times when they will be most effective and when you tell us you most need them. We will ensure your team are not taken away from neighbourhood business more than is absolutely necessary. They will spend at least 80% of their time visibly working in your neighbourhood, tackling your priorities. Staff turnover will be minimised.
 4. Respond to every message directed to your Neighbourhood Policing Team within 24 hours and, where necessary, provide a more detailed response as soon as we can.
 5. Aim to answer 999 calls within 10 seconds, deploying to emergencies immediately giving an estimated time of arrival, getting to you safely, and as quickly as possible. We will aim to get to you within 15 minutes.
 6. Answer all non-emergency calls promptly. If attendance is needed, send a patrol giving you an estimated time of arrival and:
 - If you are vulnerable or upset aim to be with you within 60 minutes.
 - If you are calling about an issue that we have agreed with your community will be a neighbourhood priority and attendance is required, we will aim to be with you within 60 minutes and in rural areas within 20 minutes.
 - Alternatively, if appropriate, we will make an appointment to see you at a time that fits in with your life and within 48 hours.
 - If agreed that attendance is not necessary we will give you advice, answer your questions and /or put you in touch with someone who can help.
 7. Arrange regular public meetings to agree your priorities, at least once a month, giving you a chance to meet your local team with other members of your community. These will include opportunities such as surgeries, street briefings and mobile police station visits which will be arranged to meet local needs and requirements.
 8. Provide monthly updates on progress, and on local crime and policing issues. This will include the provision of crime maps, information on specific crimes and what happened to those brought to justice, details of what action we and our partners are taking to make your neighbourhood safer and information on how your force is performing.
 9. If you have been a victim of crime agree with you how often you would like to be kept informed of progress in your case and for how long. You have the right to be kept informed at least every month if you wish and for as long as is reasonable.
 10. Acknowledge any dissatisfaction with the service you have received within 24 hours of reporting it to us. To help us fully resolve the matter, discuss with you how it will be handled, give you an opportunity to talk in person to someone about your concerns and agree with you what will be done about them and how quickly.

Ordsall Hall gets put to bed

3700 people took the opportunity to make one last visit to Ordsall Hall in the month before it shut its doors in February for a two-year restoration project.

£4.1 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund and a further £2.4 million, made up of funding from the council, grants and donations, will go towards transforming the 700 year old Grade 1 listed building into a 21st century visitor attraction.

Repairs to the external walls and roof will begin the major works, with longer-term improvements including re-developed grounds, a new learning and community room, improved exhibits and more rooms made public.

During its closure Ordsall Hall will 'take to the road' with an outreach programme including visits to schools and community groups.

The common sexually transmitted infection produces hardly any symptoms. But, left untreated, it can cause problems in pregnancy and infertility in both men and women.

Margaret Byrne, Salford PCT Sexual Health Nurse, said: "There are a lot of places where people can access community testing, and we are trying to get young people to use condoms.

Even if you are in a relationship, it's nice to know that you are clear, so it is a good thing to get a test. All you have to do is give a sample of your urine."

Chlamydia symptoms include pain on passing urine, and some bleeding in between periods for women. But as Margaret points out, this is also likely to happen if you are on the pill.

The test for chlamydia is safe, painless, and confidential, and can also detect gonorrhoea.

Results can be received by text or letter and the treatment is a short course of high-strength antibiotics.
