- Old River – It was requested that an update be provided from the Environment Agency at the next meeting with regard to the pollution.

- I&C Community High School – It was confirmed that John Ferguson is to be the new Head Teacher at the high school due to the retirement of Adrian Lamb.

Cumberland Avenue Allotment Regeneration



Green fingered gardeners from I&C have recently joined forces with Salford City Council to regenerate the statutory allotment site at Cumberland Ave in Cadishead which was last used in 1996. With growing waiting lists across the country, SCC is leading the way in developing its allotments and helping its residents embrace the return to the 'Good Life'. A committee formed by local residents is working closely with the council to shape the project and the long term future of the site.

Like most modern day allotments, the site will be an integral part of the local community providing numerous benefits ranging from a source of nutritious food and exercise to the social benefits of making new friends. The proposed fifteen plots will include one specially adapted for usage by those with disabilities. Additional plans for the site include the provision of running water, an environmentally friendly composting toilet and off-road parking.

Operation Brocade - reducing anti-social behaviour in I&C

Operation Brocade is a partnership initiative which operates at key times for anti social behaviour. The peak days across the City for reports of anti social behaviour are Friday and Saturday evening. Operation Brocade consists of Police and Community support officers from the Neighbourhood Policing team plus additional officers funded centrally. The focus of these officers are the identified hotspots for youths congregating and causing nuisance. Officers are allocated according to hot spot analysis and recently Irlam and Cadishead have had the benefit of these extra resources.

The emphasis for police staff is to identify offenders and deal with them appropriately, seize alcohol from those under age and identify and prosecute anyone selling or supplying alcohol to under age children. The police do not want to discourage young people from enjoying themselves or using the facilities, such as parks and open spaces, that are available to them. What they do want to do is to encourage young people to enjoy themselves without putting themselves at risk, or inconveniencing other members of the community.

Staff can confiscate alcohol, disperse people in groups, stop and account, stop and search, enforce the alcohol ban and give fixed penalty notices for disorder, litter and illegal supply of alcohol. On Saturday and Sunday mornings, additional staff conduct follow up visits to the parents of those young people that were spoken to due to their behaviour. If it is deemed necessary, eg child protection issues are identified, or concerns for alcohol abuse are identified, this information can be shared with other professionals to provide the child and their family with support and intervention.

There is also the opportunity to provide follow up visits to members of the community who have reported anti social behaviour but who may not have received a visit from the police at the time. Sometimes victims don't want the police to call as they don't want offenders to be made aware that they have contacted the police. In these cases contact can be made by telephone.

Operation Brocade also involves Youth Services. They have extra resources in the hot spot areas and these detached youth workers are able to engage with groups of youths who may not wish to go to more formal locations such as the youth clubs. It is possible to divert the young people away from disorderly behaviour and provide education in relation to the harm caused by drink and substance misuse.

Brocade has proved its worth in the area and there has been a reduction in nuisance and better partnership working practice established.

Unity Radio Bus comes to Irlam

On four consecutive Friday nights over May, young people in Irlam were given the opportunity to DJ, create music and broadcast on the internet, with the support of Unity Radio.

Unity Radio is a local radio station and underground music collective, who specialise in engaging young people in positive activities and social education workshops.

With their double-decker bus parked at Prince's Park, Unity signed up over one hundred young people to the four-week programme, all of whom received a CD and leaflet advice on a range of youth issues.



Unity Radio were specifically commissioned to provide a diversionary activity for young people, who may otherwise become engaged in nuisance or criminal behaviour, as part of Operation Brocade. This is a multi-partner approach to tackling anti-social behaviour that occurs on Friday evening.

Unity's success in engaging so many young people is down to their knowledge of street based culture and urban music. Young people met professional recording artists and MC's over the course of the programme.

In total, 149 young people engaged with the project in the four week period.

Whit Holiday activities



The Whit holidays saw an increased participation in physical activity for young people aged 8 - 16 in Irlam & Cadishead. Four days of sport and leisure activities took place across two venues. Morning sessions were delivered at Moorfield's and St Joseph's Primary School Field and afternoon sessions were delivered at Fit City Cadishead. As part of a new government initiative, SPLASH sessions are now being offered free of charge to under 17's and complemented delivery within Irlam & Cadishead.

Supplementary activities were also on offer and transport was provided to various venues across the city where the young people could participate in activities such as Gymnastics and Trampolining, Mixed Martial Arts & Watersports. These sessions were offered to young people attending the above "open access" sessions.

On Thursday 28th May 2009, in partnership with Greater Manchester Police, a city wide Football Festival was held at The Salford Sports Village, Littleton Road, in which a team of 7 individuals represented the Irlam & Cadishead community. Engaging young males aged 15 - 16, participants came from the different communities i.e. estates that collectively make up the City of Salford. Although the team finished near the bottom of the league they showed great commitment and enthusiasm through out.

On Friday 29th May 2009 over 100 young people representing the Cities Community Committee areas participated in a Rounder's Festival, held at Fit City Cadishead, Lord Street. The focus was school years 4, 5 & 6 and years 7 & 8 during which all of Irlam and Cadishead teams finished at the top of their League Tables receiving first place Trophies.

Bikeability: Cycling for children



Trying to get round bollards in a school playground may not be the obvious way to prepare you for traffic in the rush hour. However teachers,

parents and school children at St Teresa's Primary School are learning to cycle safely through the Bikeability Training Scheme. The scheme helps to train children to start cycling on the road and away from cars.

Bikeability is the new cycling proficiency for the 21st Century. It has been introduced to help make cycling an everyday activity as a form of transport with a way to keep healthy and above all to have lots of fun!

Pedestrian refuge on corner of Ferryhill Road/Liverpool Road – Irlam Community Centre.

Highway's Sub Committees have been meeting regularly since local devolved budgets were passed down to community committees to decide on spending priorities for local schemes.

Community consultation originally took place for this scheme when individual community committee representatives attended an information course on Road Safety awareness. Older pedestrians had expressed their concern about fast traffic and busy roads in the local area. These concerns were evident along Liverpool Road



in Irlam where several roads meet at different intersections and junctions. Educating drivers about their responsibility to vulnerable road users is a challenging process and takes time to be effective. Driver behaviour at road intersections when cars are travelling at speed or also turning and manoeuvring has been a serious issue at this section of Liverpool Road opposite the Community Centre.

Once a design brief had been organised a sketch scheme was discussed at the local Community Committee meeting. Local residents were all consulted. It was agreed that the pedestrian island would be installed on the Ferryhill Road gable end near to the Community Centre. The scheme was completed in April 2009. The positive aspects of this scheme are seen as reducing vehicle speed, improving road safety and preventing dangerous speeding and overtaking along this road. There were concerns at the consultation about the reduction of street parking. However this was not an issue as the scheme is near to a GMPTE bus stop lay-by, and is visually well placed.

The main positive outcome of this pedestrian refuge is that it now provides the safest place to cross a busy road. The traffic island allows pedestrians to walk slowly to the centre of the road and cross the road in two halves. Due to the proximity to the local Community Centre the pedestrian refuge is well used by local residents and users of the Community Centre.

Digital Switchover and W4B

Digital Switchover is coming to our region in November and the Digital Switchover Helpscheme should be contacting eligible people in plenty of time about the help and support available to them. If you are eligible the helpscheme can:

- provide you with easy-to-use equipment that suits your needs
- help with installing equipment in your home
- fit a new dish or aerial, where we can, if it is needed to make the new equipment work
- give you an easy-to-understand demonstration of how everything works and there will be someone you can call for help while you're getting used to things

You may be eligible if you are aged 75 or over, or have lived in a care home for six months or more, or get (or could get) certain disability benefits, or are registered blind or partially sighted.

There is also a charity called W4B – www.w4b.org.uk which can provide a range of digital ready TVs and radios on long-term loan for older and disabled people. Applications need to be supported by a referee – eg a charity, a recognised religious organisation, care worker or personal assistant.



Hay Meadow – Prince’s Park

A new wildlife meadow has been created in Princes Park, Irlam. The areas of grass alongside the Old River have been left uncut, allowing it to grow long enough to develop seed and encourage a wide variety of plant species and wildlife such as butterflies, bees and birds. This aims to imitate a traditional hay meadow, which supports a broad diversity of wildlife. Paths have been created through the meadow areas to allow people to wander freely as though they were in the countryside. The project has developed as a result of Salford’s Greenspace strategy, which aims to promote biodiversity within the city, much of which has been lost to development. In September, the grass will be cut and the clippings removed, and for the winter months it will remain as before.

Planning Applications

Proposed Household Waste Recycling Centre, Boysnope Wharf, off A57 Irlam

The Proposal

Planning permission was granted for a Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC). The HWRC will be developed on a site of 1.6ha that forms part of a larger site comprising some 3.2ha. The remaining land will be retained in the Council’s ownership for its designated purpose as a wildlife corridor and proposed strategic recreational route.

The HWRC would be capable of handling up to 15,000 tonnes of waste per annum and will accept household wastes delivered to the site by members of the public. It will operate as a split level facility for bulk recycle and residual waste. Trade and commercial waste will not be accepted.

Recycling will be encouraged by partitioning waste into different recycling products but no process (eg Anaerobic digestion) will take place on the site. Residual waste will be transferred to landfill.

The application we approved at the Planning and Transportation Regulatory Panel on the 22 January 2009, subject to a number of conditions, one of which included a Section 106 Agreement for a provision of a strategic recreational route and its maintenance over a 20 year period.

Port Salford

The application was deferred at the meeting of the Planning Panel on 16 April 2009 in order for additional information to be provided to:

- Enable an assessment to be made of the impact of pollution and any associated mitigation which might benefit residents, and
- For the submission of further detail (clarification) on traffic generation and movement

Traffic

Following concerns of members, the Highway Agency has confirmed its understanding/assessment of the proposal in the context of JETTS (the Highway Agency’s proposed M60 improvements between junctions 12 and 18), ramp metering (signals on entry slip roads), and hard shoulder running (extra narrow lanes within the existing width being introduced on the M60).

In addition a series of plans illustrating the existing and proposed routes to and from common destinations will be prepared for a future Planning Panel. This seeks to show how the new infrastructure (known as WGIS) will operate in terms of local journeys and those along the motorway.

Pollution

Air Quality and Dust - Further explanation of the baseline data and how mitigation of any significant adverse impact can be secured, will be prepared for a future Planning Panel.

Noise and Vibration - Further explanation of the baseline data and noise modelling and how mitigation of any significant adverse impact can be secured, will be prepared for a future Planning Meeting.

Light Pollution - An explanation will be given as to be purpose/need for lighting of the port and terminal facility. A lighting arrangement plan and its modelled impact will be presented to a future meeting of the Planning Panel.



City West Housing Association

To mark its launch as a new company in October 2008, City West Housing Trust made a series of 100 day pledges. One of these pledges was to support community development events across West Salford.

During December 2008 and January 2009 City West and its partner companies helped to fund and support a number of activities across Irlam & Cadishead.

Playdayz Project - City West supported a children's Christmas party, organised by the Playdayz project in December, during which presents were handed out by Santa (played by the local Community Support Police Officer) and a children's entertainer provided fun and laughter for both children and adults.

Tiger Moth Square Irlam - City West worked with Moss Vale Residents' Association & Playdayz again to provide a Fun Day on Tiger Moth Square, Irlam. This event marked the launch of City West's new housing office and also celebrated Chinese New Year. Free Chinese food was available and arts activities provided by Playdayz.

De-Traffords & The Meadows Sheltered Schemes

- The residents of both these sheltered schemes organised evening meals for themselves. At De-Trafford's, a best dressed 'Tramp' competition was held to liven up this community get-together. In total, over 300 customers attended these events and an excellent time was had by all. City West will continue to support community events and initiatives throughout Irlam & Cadishead over the coming months and years. Look out for local information to learn more and get involved.

At City West Housing Trust we are looking to develop the quarterly customer magazine. You have told us that in future issues you would like to see more community based information about what's going on in your area. This could include walkabouts and meetings and also advertise your community groups and events too.
