

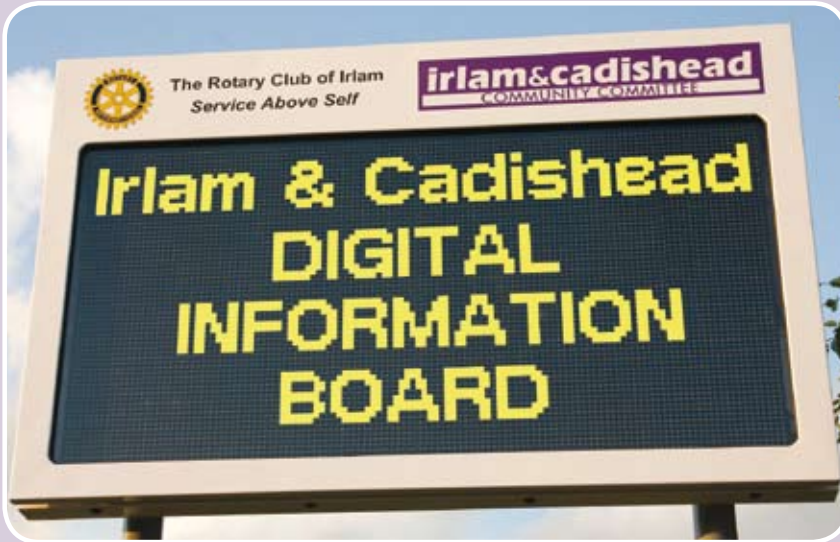

Community Committee meeting

At the first meeting of the new municipal year, the Irlam and Cadishead community meeting held on the 15th May, 2008, reappointed Christine Hudson as Chair and Ann Cavanagh Deputy Chair. Newly elected members, Councillor Bramer-Kelly and Councillor Houlton were welcomed.

The items discussed were varied, informative and included:-

An update from Stephen Bradbury, Building Schools for the Future Project Director, on the progress of the Building Schools for the Future programme. Further updates would be provided at future Committee meetings.

Insp Jill Gorse provided a policing update, which explained that, as a short-term solution to the current anti-social behaviour affecting the Irlam and Cadishead areas, Police had requested a Dispersal Order which would give them power to disperse groups of young people. Those who attended were also provided with information about HomeWatch Schemes, anyone wishing to become involved with existing Homewatch Schemes or would like to explore establishing new schemes was encouraged to contact the Police Community Support Officers based at Irlam Police Station on 0161 856 5386.

An Open Forum was held, which gave local residents the opportunity to raise local issues of concern. Some issues discussed in the forum were; traffic congestion, the greening of spaces and litter within the areas.

The Committee also considered recommendations from the Budget Sub-Group and reminded the Committee that application packs to obtain small grants are available from Chris Trueblood or Ursula Sossalla-Iredale on **0161 606 6778**.

The Committee also received invitations to attend conferences and consultation events, which affects the local area.

For more detailed information about Community Committee business, full copies of the minutes are available in local libraries and online.

New Community Committee Funding Streams

The following budgets have also been devolved to Community Committee :

Block 3 Funding (Highways - £100,000)

Criteria – SCC has devolved a portion of the main Highways Capital budget to each of the eight Community Committees to be spent on schemes that improve traffic and road safety within the Neighbourhood areas, this is referred to as Block 3 Funding.

If you have a scheme to be considered for Block 3 Funding please contact the I&C Neighbourhood Team.

SPAA Fund – Salford Sports & Physical Alliance - (£8,500)

Criteria – To increase participation in sport and physical activity. There is a maximum of £500 per project.

Community Health & Wellbeing Fund - (£5,750)

Criteria – To increasing opportunities for physical activity, helping people to achieve a healthy diet and in helping people to stop smoking.

Funding available to groups/organisations in the community and voluntary sector including small community enterprises.

Community for Health Project – (£10,000)

Bids not exceeding £1,000 can be made by any community group for sustainable schemes that will have an impact on the environment. Some examples of the types of schemes that could be funded are: Litter Pick, Planting Schemes, Community Allotment, Community Gardening Projects, schemes that contribute to increased use of local green space.

I&C 'In Bloom' & Greening of Liverpool Road Corridor



Greening of Liverpool Road Corridor

The grounds maintenance department are nearing the end of the Liverpool road greening project which has seen numerous green spaces along Liverpool Road

between Eccles town centre and the border at Glazebrook brightened up with hanging baskets, barrier baskets and new landscaping schemes. Sites in I&C include Irlam Library, Prince's Park, Hayes Road, New Moss Road and Crossfield Island, just to name a few. The project has been carried out by local parks staff using Chat Moss turf and plants. As you can see in the photographs the lads are proud of their work.



Community 'In Bloom'

Fiddlers Lane and Cadishead Children's Centres have been busy planting hanging baskets and flower boxes donated to us through the I&C 'In Bloom' project. This project was funded by Salford

West Regeneration Strategy to help brighten up our neighbourhood. All groups and partners got involved, the children and staff from Fledglings and Munchkins Day Nursery, the children, parents/carers from the Children's Centre Play and Stay groups and the local Childminders. We saw quite a few 'budding gardeners' and everyone had something to do from digging in the mud, to planting the seeds and watering the flowers. It was a great team effort! Our Children's Centres and Nurseries are now looking even more bright and cheerful, why not come down and have a look.



Children's Project

The children of I&C have planted over 4000 trees in parks and open spaces in the area.

Using a grant from the Children's Fund, all local schools have been involved in a large scale native tree planting scheme.

Tree planting is beneficial to this area.

Some of the play areas have been saturated with water for a long time, especially during this past year. Species of tree such as willow and alder are tolerant to water and will help suck up a lot of the standing water. The trees that were planted were species which are native to the area and provide shelter and food for wildlife, they included Hazel, Hawthorn, Holly, Blackthorn, Bird Cherry, Rowan, Guelder Rose and Dog Rose.

Areas which were planted with trees included: Tiger Moth Square, Caroline Street, Boundary Road, and Buckingham Road Play Area, Princes Park and Cadishead Park.

All the children involved enjoyed it hugely.

As part of this scheme pupils from ICCHS used their wood skills to design and make 7 planters were then planted up by year 5 pupils from St Teresa's RC Primary and displayed in their local community.

Children's Community Art Projects

Working with four groups of young people we designed and decorated the planters inspired by the In Bloom



project. The workshops took place at I&C SureStart, ICY and Irlam Library each working on their own ideas. The planters are displayed around various community settings.

The 'Community In Bloom' and 'The Children's Projects' were initiated and co-ordinated by Chris (Community Development Worker), Gale (Ranger), Caroline (Youth Involvement Worker), Fay (Arts Officer), Ann and Alan (Friends' of I&C Parks) and Prince's Park Garden Centre

GMMAZ

I&C Youth Centre (The Edge)

GMMAZ (Greater Manchester Music Action Zone) provide music making activities to young people who might not otherwise have the opportunity.

Since July 2006, GMMAZ has been working in partnership with key agencies in Bolton, Salford, Tameside, North Manchester and Wythenshawe to deliver the second year of the innovative On Top of the World music-making programme

Young People from Irlam and Cadishead have been working with a diverse team of inspirational and dedicated musicians to create a dynamic performance to be staged with other young people at Eccles Youth Centre

The sessions which took place at Irlam and Cadishead Youth Centre on a Tuesday and Friday evening with Youth Workers Present allowed Young People to develop and build links and relationships with GMMAZ, and to experiment and be creative with a range of instruments and sounds.

Seven young men then formed a group and began writing lyrics and songs about things that were relevant to them and their lives such as hobbies, friendship, families and school.

They each took on a different role within the group and began making music to the lyrics which they had written, this included using instruments such as guitars, drums, keyboards and mixing decks.

The young men informed us that they enjoyed participating in the sessions as it allowed them to get involved in doing something positive and stopped them from being in a drinking environment on a Friday evening.

The work that the young men have been involved in will allow them to complete one section of their Duke of Edinburgh Award, which is a recognised qualification.

Over to the young people

Cadishead Band

Tour de France, Vive la Brass

The 130 year old Cadishead Brass Band have just returned from Brittany, on their very successfully, and busy, five concert 'Tour of France 2008' where they proudly represented Salford for the third time, meeting local dignitaries and presenting a plaque to each host town.

Sensationally kicking off the tour, was the first of the spectacular march pasts, by the 27 musicians, aged between 11 - 79 years, going onto a concert at the 'Domaine Des Ormes' camp site in Brittany. The following morning the musicians were up very early, in full uniform and on the tour coach to 'hit' the market town of Combourg, where they wowed French shoppers with the echoing magical sound of 'Brass', in the High Street.

Travelling around with their own tour bus, the band played even more concerts, with professionalism and much musical talent, including a poignant one at Allomanches, the site of the D-Day Landings, playing music arranged by Roy Hesford, who for this occasion handed over the conducting baton to John Blay. The band received a commemorative medal which now takes pride of place in the band room at The Old Fire Station, Clarendon Road, Irlam.



A concert at Dinon and a Civic Reception was enjoyed by all, where yet again a plaque and CD was presented by Christine Hudson, Chair of Irlam & Cadishead Community Committee and Band Chairman Tony Sanderson. The tour ended with a final playing at Dol De Bretagne hosted by the Mayor of Dol.

North West Counties Football return to Irlam

The towns senior representative Club, IRLAM FC, based on Silver Street, has become the focus of attention for top quality football in our area. In recent seasons, whilst competing in the Manchester Premier league, the Club has developed rapidly both on and off the pitch.

On the pitch the Club have competed in the Manchester League with three teams; the First team, Reserves and "A" team. The Club is proud of the fact that the majority of its players live locally and have successfully come up through the junior clubs of Irlam and Cadishead. A good mix of players provides an excellent competitive atmosphere and encourages all our players to do their best.

Arguably the best result of the last 12 months is the help and financial support the Club has received from local groups. The Club set out to redevelop Silver Street to a standard which would allow us to compete in the North West Counties football league. After many months of hard work, the Club has been accepted into this high level football division. The Club is delighted that it has brought this level of football back to Silver Street, a ground that last saw NW counties football in the early nineties, before the sad demise of Irlam Town FC.

Community is the key to the Club now. A club house facility is planned on the ground in the near future and the accent will be for junior football use as well as development for all our young stars. The facility will also be available for non sporting groups.

The ground has just received a substantial investment in new floodlights and we hope to be able to offer night time training use to local clubs. All developments are great for our area and we want the people of Irlam and Cadishead to come down and support our teams. Weekend fixtures as well as floodlit weeknight matches will be held at the ground this year. The new facilities at the Club mean that you can come along and sit or stand to cheer the team on, in the comfort of covered accommodation.

Without their help, the Club would not have been able to match it's ambitions. The Club is indebted to the fund. My name is Dan Rowlands and I am employed by Salford City Council Parenting Support as a Support Worker for the south locality area (Eccles, Winton, Patricroft, Irlam & Cadishead). I provide advice, information and strategies for parents so that they can develop positive relationships with their children, as well as dealing with challenging behaviours.

I run group sessions and provide individual support for parents using the Triple P (Positive Parenting Programme). I work with parents who have children 8-16 years old and who are displaying challenging or anti-social behaviour. I have worked with parents and children in various settings – family support, residential childcare and youth offending. I aim to be open and honest with parents; being a parent myself, I know that it is not an easy job and that we all need support sometimes.

Irlam Dispersal Order

A dispersal order is now in place which covers Irlam and Cadishead. The order will run from 1st June 2008 for 3 months. The order will be reassessed towards the end of the 3 month period and if necessary it will be extended. This is the second time that we had a dispersal order in the area and I think it is important to answer some of the questions I was asked last time we used a dispersal order.

1) What is a Dispersal order?

The order gives officers the power to disperse groups of 2 or more who are or who are likely to be involved in antisocial behaviour. If those ordered do not disperse then they can be arrested. If they reform into a group of more than 2 within 24hrs then they can be arrested. If they live outside Irlam and Cadishead they can be ordered to leave the area and will not be allowed back into the area for 24hrs.

2) Why was a dispersal order seen as necessary?

In the past few months innocent members of the community in Irlam and Cadishead have had their homes and vehicles damaged by large groups of youths. On several occasions groups of over 50 youths have congregated in the area drinking, harassing people and causing a nuisance. Police and Community Support Officers have seized and poured away large quantities of alcohol. Youths have been arrested and prosecuted because of their abusive behaviour. A dispersal order will allow officers to quickly disperse groups who are involved in or likely to be involved in this type of behaviour. It gives us the power to act to stop problems before they occur.

3) Why are there still groups of youths on the streets? Surely this means the order is not working?

A dispersal order is not a curfew. It does not give the Police a blanket cover to remove youths from the streets. You will still see groups of youths on the streets. Groups will only be dispersed when they are or are likely to cause antisocial behaviour. The vast majority of the youths who live in Irlam and Cadishead cause no problems whatsoever.

4) I'm over 40 and the Police have dispersed me. Surely they can't do that?

A dispersal order applies to everyone within the area of Irlam and Cadishead. It has been brought in to deal with antisocial behaviour and that applies to both youths and adults. You should not think of it as applying just to children. It applies equally to children and adults alike.

5) I live in Eccles and have been stopped by the Police in Irlam. They now say I have to leave the area of Irlam and Cadishead or I will be arrested. Can they do this?

If you live outside the area which is covered by a dispersal order and cause or are suspected of being likely to cause antisocial behaviour in that area then yes, you can be ordered to leave the area. You will not be allowed to re-enter the area for 24hrs.

6) How will I know if my son or daughter has been dispersed?

If your child is dispersed then we will write to you so that you can speak with them about their behaviour.

If your child is repeatedly spoken to you will be visited at home by a Police or Community Support Officer. This will give the Police the opportunity to discuss your child's behaviour with you. Should your child be dispersed again, ASBO (Antisocial behaviour order) procedures may begin.

The last dispersal order that took place in Irlam and Cadishead was a success and resulted in a significant reduction in the number of incidents of antisocial behaviour. We will again be looking to significantly reduce the number of incidents in the area. Additional officers will be on duty specifically to enforce the dispersal order and deal promptly and effectively with any incidents.

The Big Drink Debate

The biggest ever survey on alcohol has been launched in the North West in a bid to understand why the region has one of the biggest alcohol problems in the country.

In Salford, binge drinking, underage drinking and violence through drinking are just some of the problems we face with over 100 people admitted to hospital on a weekly basis through alcohol related illness and injuries.

Dr Alison Giles, director of the Our Life programme said: "The Big Drink Debate isn't a finger pointing exercise telling people they shouldn't be drinking, but a campaign which we hope will start a conversation around why we have such an unhealthy relationship with alcohol in this region.

"An anonymous questionnaire has been designed and produced to help us understand people's drinking habits and attitudes towards alcohol and encourage the people of the North West to think about why we drink; where we drink, and what may make us drink less.

"The information we get will help determine whether people feel more action needs to be taken on alcohol issues and to plan what we can all do together to make sure the next generation live longer, healthier lives".

The Big Drink Debate will gather public opinion through a questionnaire during the three-month campaign which runs until **17 August 2008**.

The Big Drink Debate is being driven by the Our Life initiative which will offer new ways for the NHS, local government, the public, businesses and other sectors to work in partnership to make sure that the NW can become one of the healthiest regions in the country.

News from Trading Standards

Sale of Alcohol to underaged young people

Salford Trading Standards and GMP work closely to prevent the sale of alcohol to underage and the antisocial behaviour associated with youths obtaining alcohol. We aim to tackle these issues by way of advice, education and enforcement.

During the Home Office funded Tackling Underage Sales of Alcohol Campaign (TUSAC) running throughout 2007 and continually in Salford to March 2008 4 sales of alcohol have been made to underage persons from Costcutter 154 Liverpool Road Cadishead.

Two sales took place by two different members of staff in June 2007. The members of staff were interviewed in September 2007 one was issued with an £80 Fixed Penalty Notice. The staff and management were advised in relation to underage sales. On both occasions the volunteers were asked for ID which they could not produce and served with the alcohol anyway. One member of staff made three of the 4 sales to underage. This member of staff is no longer linked to the premises in any way.

A further sale of alcohol and tobacco was made to a 16 year old volunteer on 14th March this year. A police officer on Duty witnessed a 16 year old volunteer leaving the premises on 23rd March 2008 with two large bottles of ace cider which he had purchased from Costcutter.

An application for review of the premises licence was submitted by Salford Trading Standards and a representation in support was submitted by Greater Manchester Police in relation to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and the Protection of Children From Harm.

At the hearing today the panel listened to all evidence put to them and decided to modify the conditions of the licence at the premises to promote the licensing objectives.

There have been substantial changes to the management and personnel at the premises and we are confident that if the conditions applied by the Licensing Sub committee (attached) today are adhered to the shop will improve systems and prevent any further sales to underage.

Playdayz Project

visits Greater Manchester Police Air Support Unit



Playdayz Project visited the Air Support Unit based at Barton Aerodrome. On arrival they were greeted by very friendly staff who explained all safety issues when approaching any helicopter, that you do so from the front because of the rotor.

The GT Police MD902 Explorer, call sign 'India 99' is designed and constructed using the latest technology. It has two Pratt and Whitney 270E jet engines which power the five carbon composites blades enabling the aircraft to operate up to 170mph and 18,000 ft altitude. It also boasts a NOTAR (no tail rotor) system

which significantly reduces flight noise levels. The children were very excited and wanted to go straight to the helicopter.

Watching over Greater Manchester and supporting officers on the ground, India 99 uses high tech equipment including TV and thermal image cameras, a microwave downlink that can broadcast live pictures to ground patrols, a high powered searchlight and loud speaker system and a tracking facility for locating stolen vehicles. The interior can accommodate up to eight people and be used to carry stretcher for ambulance work. India 99 is one of the most technologically advanced police helicopters in the work.

The Playdayz members had a fantastic visit.

The Air Support Unit offers tours to groups that are interested in their work. They also have a video of the work that is done by the Air Support Unit.
