



# Community Committee meeting

The Community Committee held on the 15th November, 2007, was well attended and a range of topics were discussed.

Local Magistrate, Beryl Shepherd delivered a presentation regarding Community Justice in Salford and her role as a Magistrate. Attendees were given information about various community justice schemes and details of how to become involved.

Principal Arts Development Officer Andrea Bushell delivered a presentation to the Committee, providing updates on the Public Arts Project. Andrea highlighted the processes that the 'Marge and Steel' Art Feature had undergone, including consultations with local people. Attendees were also informed of Older People's Arts Projects which were currently being run and explained that due to the success of the schemes, ways of extending them were being considered.

The Committee was pleased to congratulate the sub-group, 'The Parks and Open Spaces Group' having been awarded the national Cleaner and Greener Innovation Award, for their co-ordinated approach to improving parks and other open spaces.

Other items included (a) Irlam and Cadishead Community Initiatives Budget Panel, including budget applications made to the Committee (b) an Open Forum, in which further local issues were raised and (c) significant developments in the area.

# Major community art scheme makes its mark in Cadishead

## Learn more about 'Marge and Steel' Public Art Feature

### Q: Where did the sculpture come from?

Two experienced artists, Marcela Livingston and Liam Curtin were commissioned to help design the piece of public art for the roundabout at the junction between the A57 and Liverpool Road. This road is one of the main routes through Irlam and Cadishead into the city which is currently undergoing regeneration and this sculpture is part of series of major improvements being made to the area.



### Q: What is the purpose of the sculpture?

The sculpture will help to improve the appearance of the main route through Irlam and Cadishead. This piece of public art will also be a landmark for the local community and visitors, giving them a sense of pride and identity. It is hoped that artwork, together with the overall improved image of the route will attract businesses bringing more jobs to the area.

### Q: What does the sculpture represent?

The sculpture brings together the two main industries in the area, the margarine and steel factories, by focusing on their qualities.

The artists compared the differences of the two industries and their complementary values and realised that while the steel factory employed mostly men the margarine factory employed mostly women. Tea dances were held at the factories and this was one way that people made new friends. Although many men and women worked in the different industries, they met socially, and many married and started families. Some of their children went on to work in the factories too. The artists looked for a way to physically unite the two industries within the design. The dance reunites the two industries in a romantic way and commemorates two important industries that made the area prosperous.

When drivers travel around the roundabout they will see the moiré patterns animate the dance.

### Q: Was there any community involvement in the project?

There has been lots of involvement with the community over the past 18 months including a long-term commitment to the project from Irlam & Cadishead Community High School who have designed a web-site about the artwork [www.islandart.org.uk](http://www.islandart.org.uk). A series of community consultations have taken place at the Community Festival and I&C Community Committee.

Children expressed their support for a superhero theme, whilst a number of adults indicated that they would like the design to reflect the Steel and Margarine works that had previously been located in the area.

Retired workers from the margarine and steel works and residents from the De Traffords have worked closely with poet Mike Garry to create a poem about the artwork.

Leading up to the celebration, there will be dance workshops for pupils at the High School. There will also be training for teachers from 9 primary schools in the area to use the education pack which has been developed with partners about the project. Community activities are still ongoing and a celebration of all the work will take place on Valentines Day, Thursday 14 February 2008, 4:00 - 6.00pm in the Arts Theatre at ICCHS.



**Q: Why is it relevant to Irlam and Cadishead?**

The margarine and steel factories have dominated the business scene in Irlam and Cadishead for many years and are part of the area’s industrial heritage. These industries had a huge impact on the daily lives of local people.

**Q: How much did it cost?**

The project was funded by a £75,000 government grant from Salford City Council’s neighbourhood renewal fund. The benefits that this piece of art will have on the area and what it stands for are invaluable to the community.

**Q: Why on a roundabout?**

The roundabout was chosen as the best place for the artwork because it sits at the junction of the A57 by-pass and Liverpool Road. This road is used by many people as a gateway into the city and the main route through Irlam and Cadishead. The location gives the sculpture momentum and ensures that it is immediately recognised.

**Q: What is public art?**

Public art is artwork in a public place like a city square, a park or street. A lot of people have mixed opinions about public art and it can be quite controversial because of its design and where it is placed. Public art can dramatically change people’s perceptions of a town, community or city and helps to put it on the map.

# Commitment to tackling crime is working!

## Salford sees substantial fall in crime

The continuous commitment of Salford crime partners to tackling crime is resulting in substantial falls in overall crime rates. Figures show a 16.8% reduction in overall recorded crimes between the start of April and the end of October in 20078 compared to figures from the previous years.

The biggest impact has been on vehicle related crimes, including stolen cars, theft from vehicle, damage to vehicles and vehicle tampering. Other areas that have seen big reductions include arson, which has been reduced by nearly 34%, criminal damage and burglary.

Salford City Council’s environmental crime team is also making a difference, actively prosecuting those responsible for blighting our city with litter, graffiti and fly tipping.

These encouraging figures are the result of a number of activities, including intelligence led operations targeting the different criminal activities.

The police are working closely with the council, the fire service, housing providers and other agencies in order to make a lasting difference to local communities sending out a clear message that crime will not be tolerated in our city.

To continue to reduce crime further we need your help. Reports from members of the public are essential in identifying problems in your area so we can target anti-crime activities.

### Comments about the work :

Lead Member for regeneration and Improvement, Cllr Merry said: “As the gateway to Salford, the artwork is a major element of the long-term plans to develop the Liverpool Road route and is a celebration of Irlam & Cadishead’s local heritage”. Lead Member for Culture at Salford City Council, Cllr Barry Warner added, “This is an inspired piece of work that links generations within the local community in a captivating and extremely visual way. We hope that the artwork becomes a real landmark to be treasured by local people and admired by visitors taking the A57/B5320 route”.

## HMO Licensing in Salford

On 6 April 2006, the city council, in accordance with the Housing Act 2004, implemented the mandatory licensing of Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMO's). The act requires all landlords / managers of HMO's of a specific description to hold an appropriate licence to operate. The definition of HMO under the act is:

A dwelling that comprises 3 or more storeys, occupied by 5 or more persons, who comprise 2 or more households.

The implementation of licensing within the city will allow the city council to better manage the private rented housing sector and help improve the quality and management standards of properties available to our residents.

The Licensing Team believe that there are many more properties that should be subject to licensing and are currently working hard to identify other properties within the city that may be required to be licensed under the Act. In order to achieve our goal and ensure that all properties that should be licensed are licensed, we would be grateful of your help.

If you are aware of any properties in your neighbourhood that meet the description given above, please call the Landlord Licensing team on 0161 793 3344. We will gladly take the details of the property from you and make discreet enquiries to confirm its eligibility for the scheme.

## I&C show their green credentials - Thank You for recycling!

The residents of I&C have demonstrated an amazing commitment to recycling. Since delivering the new bins we have seen a dramatic increase in the amounts of recyclables collected. In the first collection of both your blue and brown bins we saw a 600% increase in the amount you recycle, with approximately 75% of residents putting their bins out for collection.

To ensure we build on this success, our waste awareness officers will continue to be on hand to discuss any concern or problems that you may encounter with the service. You can also find additional information about the recycling service on the internet or you could refer back to your information pack.

## Unsure how and what to recycle....?

To make sure your recyclables can be accepted by the processing plant it is important that you take a couple of things into consideration when recycling:

- Don't put your recyclables in plastic bags, put them directly into your bins
- Make sure you are using the correct bin for your recyclables
- Avoid putting non-recyclables in your recycling bins. There are still some materials we cannot accept, including tetra packs and plastic packaging
- Wash and squash your bins a plastic bottles

## National Neighbourhood Management Award



Many congratulations to the I&C Community Committee who have won this prestigious award in the category of 'Cleaner and Greener Innovation'.

The Parks & Open Spaces Group, a sub-group of the I&C Community Committee, has developed a co-ordinated approach to improving parks that includes residents, councillors, police officer, health developers and local businesses. There is a very active Friends Group and the parks are the sites for educational and fun activities, including a BMX skate boarding group, a fishing group involving people with learning difficulties, bug hunts, bat walks, bird watching, tree and bulb planting.

I&C is part of Salford City Council's neighbourhood management structure. In 2001 local residents identified the improvement of parks and open spaces as a priority.

The group has overseen significant environmental improvements to Prince's and Cadishead Parks and other open spaces, having secured funding from several sources. It has also improved community health and social inclusion through healthy walks and other events. It was recently described by a parent as "the best thing that has happened in the district for a long time".

What the judges said: "This project has wide stakeholder and resident engagement. It found innovative and creative solutions to local issues, such as using parks as classrooms. There is high potential for sustainability and it is likely to influence mainstream provision.
