The historical census

The next census is on 27 March 2011, marking 200 years of census taking in Britain. Now Salford residents are being urged to help shape the future of their neighbourhoods by providing information which will form the basis for funding from central Government for the city.



Like our Victorian ancestors, every household in the country will be given a form to complete on behalf of everyone in the household on a certain day. This system, which was introduced in 1841 has stood the test of time, and it still forms the basis of the method we use today.

Every ten years, another batch of census records turns 100 and is released to the public. It can mark the start of a journey to discover the lives, loves and lifestyles of ancestors, or provide the final piece of the puzzle to find a 'lost' relative. If you are interested in tracing your family using census data the National Archives has a wealth of further links to information and guidance that will help you to look for your ancestors at home and abroad. Today the amount of government funding that the council and its partner agencies receive for services over the next ten years, and our planning for those services, is based on census figures.

In the last three years the population of Salford has increased making it especially important that the changes are accurately recorded.

Completing the 2011 census is compulsory, with those who fail to do so facing fines of up to £1,000.

Top marks for Salford's after stroke care

Salford has been rated as one of the best performing areas nationally for helping people recovering from a stroke.

Salford City Council's adult social care team and NHS Salford work in partnership to provide out of hospital rehabilitation care for stroke victims. The Quality Care Commission has rated Salford with full marks for managing stroke victims transfer home from hospital, follow up support and access to a named support worker.

The commission's findings placed Salford in the highest category rating possible for its longer term care and support, with only 40 out of 151 Primary Care Trusts nationally achieving this level. Other highly commended areas are services for carers and the individualised care plan prepared for people.

NEETs helped into work in Salford

Young people not in education, employment or training (NEETs) have been helped into paid work placements, leading to several gaining their first proper jobs.

Teenagers aged 16 and 17 were too young to be eligible for the national Future Jobs Fund programme, which provided six months paid work experience.

In response Salford City Council, alongside key partners and with funding from the North West Regional Development Agency (NWDA), pioneered a programme to help these younger people into work.

Placements were agreed with local employers and the teenagers were helped to prepare for the world of work by Connexions Salford, with support ranging from confidence building to help with buying clothes for work.

The programme in Salford has been such a success at moving young people into work that this approach is now being shared across Greater Manchester.

Families get the keys to new homes

Families have been handed the keys to some of the first new council homes to be completed in Greater Manchester.

Five families have moved into new houses at Eccles New Road in Weaste – the first new council homes to be built in Salford for 25 years.

The three-bed terraces are part of a £13.5 million investment for Salford which will see 101 new council homes across Salford over the next year.

This is one of only two schemes in Greater Manchester to open their doors to residents since the government allowed councils to build more homes again.

Salford's project is funded by £5.5 million from the city council and £8 million from the Homes and Communities Agency (HCA), the national housing and regeneration company for England.

All of the new houses will be built to meet the Lifetime Homes standards to make them accessible and adaptable for residents.



They will also comply with HCA standards and will be designed to save energy and reduce the city's carbon footprint.

Salix Homes, the city council's housing management company will look after the Eccles New Road houses as well as the new properties across the rest of Salford.

New homes have also been completed at Brushford Close off Worsley Road in Eccles, and Greenheys Road and Newcombe Drive in Little Hulton.

Agecroft Crematorium refurbishment

From Thursday 31 March, Agecroft Crematorium will be closed for 12 weeks while essential building work is carried out.

The building work is to meet government legislation to reduce mercury emissions and will improve facilities to the crematorium providing a new roof, a memorial walkway and an outdoor waiting area.

The cemetery will be open as usual throughout the work and burials will continue as normal from Monday to Friday. The council is working closely with the contractors to keep noise and disruption to a minimum.

The Book of Remembrance will be temporarily located in the cemetery office near the main entrance whilst the works take place.

After the 12 week period closure of the crematorium it will open on Thursdays and Fridays before it fully re-opens on Tuesday 26 July.

Teaming up for a better future

Salford City College and Salford City Council's Supported Employment Services have teamed up on a project to equip a small group of adults with learning difficulties with the necessary skills for future employment.

Sainsbury's supermarket on the Regent Road Retail Park are providing a valuable hands-on training environment for learners, giving them the opportunity to meet customers, deal with everyday workplace situations and experience a number of different roles in the retail sector.

Salford City College provide a trainer who works with the learners to equip them with essential skills for the retail environment.

Beverley Hill-Spence, Assistant Principal at Salford City College, said: "At the start of the project, the learners lacked confidence in dealing with strangers and weren't familiar with workplace routines. What the young adults lacked in

knowledge, however, they more than made up for in enthusiasm and now, thanks to the hard work of their trainer and the support and generosity of Sainsbury's, two of the original students been offered employment in the store."

The Budget

2011-2012

Message from the Leader of Salford City Council, Councillor John Merry

In Salford, like many other cities across the UK, we are facing some extremely difficult times as we come to terms with making huge budget savings for the next financial year.

In December the local government settlement was announced which meant an 8.9% reduction in our budget for 2011/12. When combined with a further reduction in our area based grants, this has meant we have had to find savings of more than £42 million or 18%.

Setting this budget has not been easy. None of us have ever had to make savings on this sort of scale before and we have been determined we would protect front line services as much as possible. But the savings do have to be made. If we didn't set a balanced budget, the government would come in and do it for us, and I firmly believe that that would put the city in an even worse situation.

A lot of the savings we have made have involved changing the way we do things and bringing services together into one location to deliver them at a lower cost. Salford City Council does have a proven track record of saving money, having made more than £20 million in the past three years, but the challenges we face this year are on a completely different scale.

We have always been committed to protecting the most vulnerable living in Salford and have therefore not changed our eligibility criteria for adults accessing social care in the city and have continued to invest in priority areas such as safeguarding.

However, it would not have been possible to make these savings without it affecting services, jobs, and ultimately people's lives, but what we've tried to do is keep this impact to a minimum.

Area Based Grant

A lot of the news coverage on the budgets has mentioned the impact of the loss of area based grants on the overall budget.

But what are area based grants? In short, these grants provide extra funding for areas that suffer from more deprivation than others.

Salford is still receiving some money from the government but it is not as much as we would have received from area based grants. Therefore the difference has had to be cut from our budget for next year increasing the 8.9% of required savings to 18%.

Bringing services together

A number of the savings Salford City Council will be making will be as a result of bringing multiple services into one building in each location. This has been done in a bid to keep as many services as possible while keeping costs such as management, rent and caretaking to a minimum. This may mean your library or youth centre may move into a different building.

Impact on jobs at Salford City Council

It is not only service users who are expected to be affected by these cuts. Up to 600 jobs at Salford City Council are also expected to be lost.

Since the budget settlement announcement was made, staff at the council have been given the opportunity to apply for voluntary early retirement or voluntary severance to reduce the need for compulsory redundancies. Staff will only be allowed to take up these voluntary options if their job is at risk, or if it is possible for someone else in the organisation whose job is at risk to move into their role. Work is underway to match people with jobs so those people who want to, can stay.

There have been more than 700 applications for these voluntary options and it is hoped it will be possible to make the necessary job cuts without the need for any compulsory redundancies for the 2011/12 budget year.



Where the savings have been made

Corporate Savings

£10,576,000 saved, 190 jobs cut

These savings are being made across the council to save money on things such as property, vehicle leasing, management structures and discretionary spend. Job vacancies will continue to be frozen unless they absolutely have to be filled and the council will look for opportunities to save money by working with other AGMA (Association of Greater Manchester Authorities) councils to get better deals. Staff have also been offered the chance to buy additional unpaid leave.

Chief Executive's Directorate

£5,474,000 saved, 27 jobs cut

The Chief Executive's directorate is responsible for co-ordinating and delivering the council's strategic priorities. The savings here involve the loss of two senior management posts and a review of the council's sponsorship and events programme.

The Skills and Work service has also been restructured in a bid to make more than £1.1 million in savings. This will result in fewer people getting the support they need to get back into work, although those who need it most will be prioritised.

Customer and Support Services Directorate

£5,092,000 saved, 106 jobs cut

Customer and Support Services manages the council's technology, finances, human resources and income, as well as providing contact centres for Salford residents across the city.

Some of the savings involve bringing more money into the council by increasing charges at the Registrar's office, introducing a credit card payment charge and increasing the fees for those people who don't pay their council tax or business rates on time.

There will be a drive to encourage residents to pay bills and contact the council online as there will be less funding for contact centres. Gateway centres will have slightly shorter opening hours and the customer contact centre will close on a Saturday. This leaves the service in place for the times when people contact us most and the out of hours emergency service will be available for those in urgent need when the services are not available.



Community Health and Social Care Directorate £4,893,000 saved, 45 jobs cut



This directorate is responsible for adult social care, culture and sport.

Although savings will be made in this area, Salford remains committed to delivering adult social care support for those with moderate as well as severe needs. A number of the plans for improvement in this area involve providing intensive support to people when they first need it to help them to regain their independence as quickly as possible. There will also be an increased use of technology such as Telecare that allows people to stay in their own homes, yet still have support if they need it.

For some time, Salford City Council has been committed to introducing personal budgets that allow people to take control of their own care plan

and buy in the products and services that they feel would help them most. Doing this would reduce the need for some of the services the council currently provides as people seek out alternatives that better suit their individual needs. For example, a man in his 30s suffering from a debilitating illness, supported by his wife, currently visits a day centre to give his wife some time to herself. With a personal budget he could pay a carer to go with him to a football match, which would be something he would prefer to do, cost less money and still give his wife a break from her caring responsibilities.

Some of the day services currently offered can be changed so people use a service that is closer to home rather than travelling, this saves on transport costs. This will also mean that day centres will cater for a wide range of different groups, rather than catering for just one set of needs.

There will be less money available to fund voluntary organisations who provide additional support, and cuts to the budgets of community committees.

Salford Community Leisure, who manage libraries and leisure centres across the city, will have their budget reduced, meaning a change to the services they provide (see below).

Sustainable Regeneration Directorate **£6,702,000 savings, 113 jobs cut**

Responsible for the city's road and buildings, Sustainable Regeneration also works towards bringing more investment into Salford.

There will be a 15% reduction in the Supporting People programme that provides housing support to some of the most vulnerable residents in the city. This will include reduced funding to support residents with learning difficulties, mental health issues, or the frail elderly to live independently in their community. The services will only be available to the most needy people, with changes to services to homeless people including the closure of Belmont Homeless Families Unit.

Parking charges across the city's car parks will increase by 30% from April and parking charges will be introduced for council staff and councillors who park on Salford City Council's office car parks.

The budget for reactive road repairs such as to potholes has been reduced but there is a plan in place to resurface many of the city's roads in the coming year, meaning repairs are less likely to be needed.

The support the council gives to help new business start up will be reduced by 80% making it more difficult for new businesses to get started in the city.

Children's Services Directorate **£5,736,000 savings, 110 jobs cut**

Children's Services is responsible for protecting and supporting children, young people and their families living in the city.

Keeping children safe remains the council's number one priority, which is why safeguarding has not been cut at all during this process. In fact, safeguarding has received additional money in the 2011/12 budget.

The city's Special Educational Needs (SEN) service has been reduced as part of the savings plan, meaning children may have to wait longer to be assessed. There will also be less training for SEN co-ordinators in schools.

There will be more focus on schools providing support for one another. Previously the government has given money to the council to support schools but this funding has now been removed so a system has been set up for schools to support each other. Teachers and staff from the best performing schools will support the poorer performing schools to help to improve them.



Environment and Community Safety Directorate

£2,742,000 savings, 72 jobs cut

This directorate is responsible for keeping the streets clean and the city safe.

There will be less spent on street cleaning as part of the new budget plans. Instead of having a strict schedule across the city, the service will focus on the areas that need it most.

There will also be less money available to maintain Salford's parks, meaning grass cutting and shrub pruning will happen less often and it will not be possible to maintain footpaths to the same standard. Some of the ranger posts will also be removed, although the ranger service will continue to exist on a smaller scale, providing support for community events.

Some charges will increase to help make the savings. Cremation fees will increase by 5% from £471.80 to £518 and burial fees by 10% from £760 to £798. There will also be charges introduced for removing asbestos, business recycling services and replacement bins will cost £25.

Domestic bin collections will not be affected in the cuts and will continue to be collected every week, green waste will remain fortnightly, however recycling collections will be monthly, rather than the current fortnightly service (see page 10 for details).

Despite a reduction in government funding, the council will continue to work with the police and partners to tackle antisocial behaviour in the city, although there will be slightly less money available to do this. There has been a reduction in management posts and a review is underway to see if specific services can be delivered at a lower cost.

Important changes to your blue and brown bin recycling collections

Thanks to your support, Salford is now recycling more items than ever before with 34% of your waste now being recycled. But we still need your help!

From 12 April 2011, your blue and brown bin, recycling collections will be changing from a fortnightly to monthly collection schedule.

Under the new scheme:

- Collection of your blue and brown recycling bins will now be once a month (instead of once a fortnight). The day of the week (Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday) that the collection takes place will not change.
- Collection of your other bins will not change with your general domestic waste (black bin) collected weekly and your garden waste (pink lidded bin) collected fortnightly.

Remember, your blue bin can be used to recycle materials like paper, newspapers, magazines, cardboard, and your brown bin can be used to recycle plastic bottles, aluminium cans, tins and foil.

From the week commencing 14 March 2011, all households in Salford will receive a new calendar sticker attached to your blue and brown recycling bins which will detail your new monthly collection dates. Please make a note of the calendar dates showing your new sequence of recycling collections.

Your questions answered?

Can I request additional recycling bins?

Yes, if you feel that you may need additional recycling containers, you can order one free of charge by calling 909 6500.

What happens if my bin gets full before my next collection?

If your bin is full and you cannot wait until your next collection, you can also take your rubbish and recycling to your nearest Household Waste Recycling Centre which are open seven days a week at the following locations:

- Brindle Heath, Cobden Street, Salford M6 6NA
- Lumns Lane, Swinton M27 8LN
- Lester Road, Little Hulton M38 0PT
- Boysnope Wharf, Irlam M30 7RH

Alternatively, you can recycle a wide range of materials at any of Salford's 23 recycling centres (brings sites) located across the city. For details www.salford.gov.uk/bringsites

Can I leave any additional side waste next to my bin?

No, unfortunately we cannot collect anything left at the side of your bin. All waste must be placed inside your recycling container and the lid of your bin must be closed when you put it out.

Tip: To maximise the capacity of your bin, break up and flatten recyclable materials such as plastic bottles or cardboard where possible.

Remember to only recycle the above items in your recycling container. Please do not put anything else inside your recycling container (such as plastic bags) or it may not be collected.

Spikey says... "Stick it in the right bin"

Are you recycling right?

Comedian Dave Spikey (pictured) has been encouraging Salford residents to make sure their waste goes into the right bin for recycling.

The Phoenix Nights star is behind the campaign, which is urging people to 'Recycle Right' as council bin crews have found everything from children's plastic toys to hose pipes and plastic kitchen colanders placed in residents' recycling bins.

Plastic bottles, glass bottles, jars, cans, tins and foil are the only materials which can be recycled in the brown recycling bin.

Other types of plastic, such as plastic bags, food trays, yoghurt pots, plastic film and plant pots

cannot be recycled as very few companies are able to turn them into new products. They should be placed in the black rubbish bin.

It is very difficult and expensive to sort plastics that are wanted from those that are not, and if a bin contains large amounts of the wrong type of materials, it may all have to be rejected and sent to a landfill site.

Remember, all plastic bottles that are found in the kitchen, the bathroom and under the sink, such as washing up liquid, squash and bleach bottles, can be recycled.

Local people decide how to spend **money** in their neighbourhood

Salford City Council is committed to involving local people in decisions about the city. One example of this is the devolved budget which is allocated to local communities. In 2010/11 £651,000 was devolved to community committees who made the decisions on how the budget should be spent.

How was the money spent?

Between April and December 2010, over 250 groups, ranging from residents' associations to playgroups obtained funding from community committees. The funding helped the groups to deliver a range of activities to meet the priorities of the local community.

The table below shows how residents chose to spend the local budget.

The residents of Sindsley Court sheltered accommodation recently received a grant from the Swinton Community Committee for just under £2000. This paid for internet and computer equipment for use by residents in their community room.

Centre manager Pat Warburton said: "This grant has transformed our centre. Residents have learned new skills and now they can communicate with the wider world, including their families and friends who may live far away."

Another example of funding is from the East Salford Community Committee who funded the Rialto Gardens Social Group. The funding from the devolved budget was used to plan social gatherings that involve the more isolated members of the community in a place near their home.

There are eight community committees in Salford, one in each neighbourhood area. They make decisions about priorities for the area – from providing youth activities to improving a local park or improving road safety.

Worried about changes to benefits?

The government is making changes to benefits and you may be worried about how you will be affected. The council will do everything we can to keep you updated and to support you. Some of the changes that you can expect are listed below.

Housing benefit for private tenants

The government has changed the way this is calculated which may result in reduced benefit. We will write to you if you are going to be affected.

Unable to work for health reasons

People claiming out-of-work benefits due to ill health are going to have their claims reassessed. A high number of claimants are likely to be assessed as 'fit to work' resulting in loss of benefits. Jobcentre Plus will contact you when you are to be reassessed.

If you have children

A number of benefits are going to be frozen or reduced. Child Benefit will be frozen and the criteria for maternity grants has been restricted to one child under 16 per family. There are also likely to be changes and cuts to Child Tax Credit and to elements of Working Tax Credit.

Get help and advice

Go to www.salford.gov.uk/betteroff for information help and advice around these issues. There are updates around benefits cuts and information on support you can get. There is also money advice and debt support and information on help to get into work.

Don't live with anti-social behaviour. Report it.

Anti-social behaviour in your neighbourhood can have a massive effect on your life. From graffiti, vandalism and fly-tipping to intimidation and threatening behaviour, you shouldn't have to suffer in silence.

Salford City Council's Anti-Social Behaviour team deals with complaints from homeowners and tenants in privately rented homes. They work closely with the police, youth service, environmental services and other agencies to resolve problems. Depending on the nature of your complaint, they can speak to the people who are causing you problems, send warning letters and carry out interviews. If you're having disputes with your neighbours they can act as intermediaries and in more serious cases they can apply to the courts for an anti-social

behaviour order (ASBOs) or injunction.

How to report a complaint

You can report an anti-social behaviour problem on the council's website at www.salford.gov.uk/asb-report-it or call 909 6544

Your complaint will be strictly confidential and you will not be identified. Once you have contacted the team, an officer will meet with you and agree an action plan. There will be a full investigation and you will be kept informed every step of the way.
