What is **neighbourhood management** and how does it work?

Neighbourhood management is a way for Salford City Council and its partners to work with communities to make sure that local people have a say about decisions being made in their local area. It recognises that we need to listen and respond to people at a local level if we are to get things right. This means you have more influence over how local services are provided, from street cleaning and improving parks, to crime and safety in your area.

We have divided Salford into eight neighbourhoods, each with a Community Committee which provides a forum for residents to get involved. Community Committees identify local priorities, develop action plans for their area and allocate local budgets.

The committees are supported by Neighbourhood Management teams which look after the interests of that community. By working together with the police, fire service, health service, housing agencies,

youth services, community groups, and other agencies, we aim to make things better for your area and to provide services that meet your needs.

How can you get involved?

We believe residents are the best people to identify what needs to be improved in their neighbourhood. By getting involved and having your say you can influence decisions being made about services provided in your area. You can attend your Community Committee and get involved through some of the working groups to focus on specific issues such as parks, road safety, children and young people. You can raise issues with councillors and officers who work on your behalf. If there is a problem affecting your neighbourhood, or you have a good idea to improve things for you and your community, talk to your Neighbourhood Management team (contact details on back page).

Free training for local women

Bulky waste collections

The committee granted the group £982 from its budget and the club was also awarded £500 from the Salford Sports and Physical Alliance Fund. As well as giving the grant, the Community Committee has offered help with future fundraising.

Ken Yu Kai Karate has 23 members and is one of the voluntary run groups in Ordsall and Langworthy which helps to give young people something positive to do. This year the club has had great success winning 22 medals at the Ken Yu Kai Nationals including four gold medals.

Local residents shout out about poor TV reception

Local residents in Ordsall finally had a chance to have their say about on-going problems with their digital TV reception when Digital UK held a surgery with residents to discuss the issues.

Local councillor Ray Mashiter and Ordsall resident Jim Doyle first raised this issue with the Ordsall and Langworthy Community Committee.

Residents then worked together to raise awareness of the issue, which included a petition which was signed by over 800 Ordsall residents, as well as contacting Hazel Blears MP who went on to support their cause. Led by Jim Doyle and supported by Councillor Mashiter, the community worked hard to raise awareness of the ongoing and frustrating issue of poor television reception.

As a direct result of their actions, Digital UK, who are the body implementing the UK's switchover to digital television, organised a surgery at the Ordsall Community Cafe in December. This surgery gave residents the chance to have their say and share their problems with Digital UK.

A step closer to a new Pendleton

Following a period of extensive public consultation the plans for Pendleton's PFI housing proposals were given the green light at the end of 2008. The £121 million funding package will see Pendleton develop into a 21st century neighbourhood of choice. Throughout the planning process local residents were asked for their opinions about plans and helped develop the vision for the area. Local residents also sat on the steering group so that they could represent the views of their community.

Local company cleans up at property awards!

LPC Living's new homes in Ordsall have received two prestigious accolades. First, the company was crowned 'Best Developer' in Greater Manchester at the Manchester Evening News 2008 Property Awards. The Salford-based regeneration developer beat off tough competition from the cream of the property industry to pick up the top prize of the evening.

Just a few weeks later the developer's Radclyffe Mews scheme picked up the bronze award for Best Starter Home at the What House 2008 Property Awards – the only development outside the South East to win in the category.

The judges were impressed by the fact that the scheme sold all the homes off-plan within six weeks of launch, with two thirds of the homes being bought by people living or working in the Ordsall area.

Radclyffe Mews was the first residential scheme to be built under the Ordsall Development Framework, a pioneering £150 million regeneration partnership between LPC Living and Salford City Council to

improve and rejuvenate housing and community facilities in the area.

Simon Ashdown, Development Director at LPC Living, said: "For our work in Ordsall to be recognised at a national level is an extraordinary achievement, particularly considering the high standard of competition in this category".

Although Radclyffe Mews is now a sell out, LPC Living is already well underway with their next Ordsall development, called Hulton Square. Phase one, due to be completed this spring, comprises a broad range of high specification apartments and townhouses at first-time buyer friendly prices.

Assistance is available for those looking to get on the property ladder with selected homes available on a first time buyer initiative. This government backed scheme allows a first time buyer to take out a mortgage for as little as 50% of the property's purchase price, with the difference being topped up.
