## Salford treated to an 'ice' surprise this winter



The Civic Centre's lawns got a magenta makeover this Christmas as Salford hosted Europe's first coloured ice skating rink.

Thousands of people came to Salford to enjoy the festive celebrations with many eager to get their skates on to try out the ice.

Olympic junior skating duo, Nick Buckland and Penny Coombes took to the

ice in a special performance to mark the opening of the city council's Salford Winter Wonderland which attracted nearly 300 skaters on its first night.

Specialist techniques from Holland were used to make the ice reflect Salford City Council's corporate colours and a traditional funfair and festive stalls provided a variety of entertainment.

Rugby stars from Salford City Reds, Malcolm Alker and Stuart Littler also showed their support for the event to encourage people to get skating.

Cllr David Lancaster, deputy leader of the city council said: "We've wanted to treat the city to a festive event like this for a long time and what a better way to do this by bringing Britain's first magenta ice rink to Salford.

"Many people will recognise magenta as the signature colour of the city and the event has brought a variety of entertainment to peoples' doorsteps."

**The event ran from 8 December until 6 January 2008.**



## HMO licensing in Salford.

On 6th April 2006 the city council, in accordance with the Housing Act 2004, implemented the mandatory licensing of Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMO's). The act requires all landlords / managers of HMO's of a specific description to hold an appropriate licence to operate. The definition of an HMO under the act is:

**A dwelling that comprises 3 or more storeys, occupied by 5 or more persons, who comprise 2 or more households.**

The implementation of licensing within the city will allow the city council to better manage the private rented housing sector and help improve the quality and management standards of properties available to our residents.

The Licensing Team believe that there are many more properties that should be subject to licensing and are currently working hard to identify other properties within the city that may be required to be licensed under the Act. In order to achieve our goal and ensure that all properties that should be licensed are licensed we would be grateful of your help.

If you are aware of any properties in your neighbourhood that meet the description given above please call the Landlord Licensing team on 0161 793 3344. We will gladly take the details of the property from you and make discreet enquiries to confirm its eligibility for the scheme.

## Residents helped back into work thanks to new course

**A series of new training courses held across the city has helped a group of Salford residents to get back into work.**

The residents, some of whom have been unemployed for several years, have already secured a job or have gone onto further training after completing a course run by Groundwork in Salford.

The jobs landed through the Successful Transitions course are with key employers Royal Mail and Work Solutions and even include a work experience placement with Groundwork.

The course is funded by Salford City Council and is aimed at long term unemployed residents, lone parents and people with health conditions who are looking to make a positive change in their lives.

One resident has also started to study computer skills through the European Computer Driving Licence Foundation (ECDL) since the course and another will shortly be starting training in mechanics with FirstStep Trust.

Other individuals have taken on volunteering at Blackleach Country Park, City Centre Rangers, Ordsall Community Cafe and Spurgeon's Children's Services.

The course has been running since April and works with people to boost their confidence while encouraging them to realise and develop their existing skills.

It also gives guidance to people on how to write a CV as well as tips to filling in job application forms and is the equivalent of an NVQ Level 1 qualification.

So far classes have been held in Pendleton and Swinton and next week sees the completion of the Little Hulton course.

Councillor John Merry, leader of Salford City Council said: "This is a great way to encourage people to realise their own potential and get them building on the skills they already have so that they can use them to their full potential.

"I'm delighted that we have helped to open up so many opportunities for people who wouldn't necessarily have had the confidence to make positive changes in their lives without the course."

## Salford City Radio on the Airways

Salford City Radio had a successful launch and is going from strength to strength with over 40,000 hits on the website! Its not just good radio, it also provides opportunities for members of the community to both volunteer at the station and to host their own programmes. As part of a larger Community Development Team I was lucky enough to be invited for a tour of the station by Councillor Jim King and met the manager and volunteers. They were all very enthusiastic and keen to tell us all about the work they do and how they are looking to engage the communities of Salford and encourage them to support and take a real ownership of their local station.

"Staff and volunteers were so keen they even tried to let us lose on the airways! Swinton you don't know what a lucky escape you had!!"

To continue as an independent community radio station Salford City Radio is now looking for further funding, not just to carry on broadcasting but to continue to support volunteer learning and community engagement.

Councillor King Said "I think we have built a really good community 'resource' here. It has not been easy but the 'hard graft' has really now been done. I hope you will agree that, it would be a tragedy if it were now to 'close down' on 1 April next year, due to lack of funding. Even a 'short break' of two or three months would break up the nucleus of people we currently have and would be very difficult to be put back together again."

"As a 'presenter' myself I can say that anyone who tries this will get a real 'kick' out of it and it would look very good on a CV too."

### Higher Profits for Employers & Higher Income for Employees in Salford

Pendleton Business Centre, the commercial arm of Pendleton College, has worked closely with hundreds of employers in the Salford and Greater Manchester area for the last 4 years providing training in areas such as NVQs, business & administration, team leading, customer service, health and social care, teaching assistants and early years qualifications. ### Maximum Effort in Swinton Project

The ME project is an exciting new project that has been developed in Swinton High School by School staff, Salford Youth service, and the Police. It provides groups of 10 young people with personal development opportunities that will lead them to gain Duke of Edinburgh’s Award accreditation. The project will emphasise that the more effort a young person can commit to this project the more challenges will be met and the benefits will increase. This project is due to start in January and run throughout the school year and will operate from Deans Activities Centre, Deans Road, Swinton.

### Cliffton Youth Centre (Salford Youth Service)

Cliffton youth centre has been open for four weeks on a Friday evening between the times of 615 to 845. The atmosphere has been lively and vibrant with over 40 young people participating in Youth club activities. Additionally we now have a MCing room with the young people taking the lead on encouraging other young people to show off their MCing skills. The young people have been identifying their own ground rules for the centre and they have identified the need for some Additional equipment for the MCing which they will apply to youth bank for.

## The Senior Action Group

The Senior Action Group (SAGs) for Swinton and surrounding area, an Older People's forum to feedback information on local services with a remit around providing a range of health related activities/information has recently established a management committee.

The SAGs group hope to hold three Information & Consultation events at local venues within the Swinton, Clifton & Pendlebury area over the next twelve months. These will provide an opportunity for older people to find out about local services and activities. They will also give an opportunity for older people to express their views about health and social support needs during group sessions. SAGs coordinated their first Consultation & Information Event on 3rd October at Swinton Masonic Hall. The event was a great success with 70 older people in attendance.

The group also intend to hold four Tea Dances over the next twelve months, enabling the older people to enjoy exercise in a social setting, strengthen community spirit, reducing isolation and depression, particularly for those living alone.

Their first Christmas Tea Dance attracted over 150 attendees. Everyone had a great time and thoroughly enjoyed the live entertainment, dancing, raffle and a hot/cold buffet. Brenda from the Health Improvement Team and the children from the Valley

Breakfast Club spent three after school sessions making sensational place mats as a gift for those attending the Tea Dance. Everyone admired the mats and appreciated the children's effort.

It is clear that there is a need for more information events and social events such as the Tea Dance.

Salford Community Safety Unit, in partnership with Greater Manchester Police, Neighbourhood Management and other agencies have launched a publicity campaign to strengthen the message of vehicle crime awareness and ways to reduce it.



### What can you do to help?

Take time to read available literature on keeping your vehicle and belongings safe and act upon it. By following a few simple steps we can all work together to eliminate the problem.

- Always park in approved car parks
- Always keep your vehicle locked, even if you only leave it for a few seconds
- Secure your vehicle with an immobiliser, alarm or tracking device
- Remove all items of property when you leave your vehicle, including Sat Navs, their mounting cradles and always remember to wipe away any sucker marks
- Consider leaving your glove compartment open to show thieves that it is empty

## Commitment to tackling crime is working!

### Salford sees substantial fall in crime

The continuous commitment of Salford crime partners to tackling crime is resulting in substantial falls in overall crime rates. Figures show a 16,8% reduction in overall recorded crimes between the start of April and the end of October in 2007 compared to figures from the previous year.

The biggest impact has been on vehicle related crimes, including stolen cars, theft from vehicle, damage to vehicles and vehicle tampering. Other areas that have seen big reductions include arson, which has been reduced by nearly 34%, criminal damage and burglary.

Salford City Council's environmental crime team has also making a difference, actively prosecuting those responsible for blighting our city with litter, graffiti and fly tipping.



These encouraging figures are the result of a number of activities, including intelligence-led operations targeting the different criminal activities.

The Police are working closely with the council, the Fire Service, housing providers and other agencies in order to make a lasting difference to local communities sending out a clear message that crime will not be tolerated in our city.

To continue to reduce crime further we need your help. Reports from members of the public are essential in identifying problems in your area so we can target anti-crime activities

We welcome applications from all sectors of the community. The Committee is particularly keen to hear from people who are under 50 as this age group is currently under represented.

## Swinton Families achieve Towards Excellence Award 'with Outstanding Commitment'

Swinton Families is one of the projects selected from a number of projects in Salford to work towards this award with the support of Volunteer Centre Salford. The comprehensive programme has enabled the project to work towards and achieve diversity through good practice and recognition on a wider level. The programme has required a 'top-down' commitment, which included Project Manager- Pat Higson, Volunteer Co-ordinator Shahanara Begum, Toy Library Volunteer: Anastasia Sinclair, Community Volunteer: Edna Smith and contributions from all of Swinton Families Volunteers. Good relationships have been formed with the other organisations that also undertook the 'Towards Excellence' programme. The aims of the programme focused on recruiting and promoting to a wider range of potential Volunteers.

All Volunteers have had the opportunity to contribute towards this award through either directly getting involved in the review meetings, through word of mouth or comments on evaluation forms. Assessment of the award included submission of a portfolio of how we met the aims and a panel interview which consisted of representatives from 'Volunteer Centre Salford', 'Goldstar Project', 'Partners in Salford' and 'Tameside CVS'.

The panel agreed that the Swinton Families team and its Volunteer Scheme "had made real strides towards putting in place the foundations of good practice for recruiting, supporting, retaining Volunteers and valuing diverse skills". The panel felt that Swinton Families "have truly embraced the spirit of Towards Excellence and demonstrated an innovative and diverse approach to managing Volunteers". The "training and development programmes are of professional standard and as an organisation have shown to be committed to continually changing for the better, in order to provide a much needed service to local families". As a result of innovation and consistently high standards the panel also recommended Swinton Families to receive the award with 'Outstanding Commitment'.

## Groundwork

### Improvements to Clifton Green

The Clifton CREW (Create Respect Everyone Wins) are a group of local young people from the Clifton Green area who have been working with youth workers through Groundwork's Young People Friendly Neighbourhoods project, part of a national programme funded by the Big Lottery Fund. The Clifton Crew have been speaking to local residents including young people as part of this project to discuss young people's role in the area and how they are able to have a positive impact. Through this process they had the opportunity to make a DVD about issues faced by young people, they chose to look at the negative impact that the lack of sports facilities has on the area. The film, which focuses on vandalism to the sports pitch to the rear of the Youth Centre and discusses young people's need for safe and useable facilities, was shown at the Salford Film Festival.

Salford City Council, Environmental Services have Section 106 funding to spend on making improvements to Clifton Green, and through consultation carried out with local residents it was decided to create a Multi Use Games Area and a play area for children under the age of five in this area. This will complement the new play area on the nearby LIVIA site and ensure facilities suitable for children and young people of all ages are provided in the area. Path improvements and entrance features have already been completed on site with funding secured by Red Rose Forest.

Additional funding was granted from the community committee devolved budget to enable Groundwork to continue to work with the Clifton Crew and this has funded a number of training sessions in project management to help them understand the stages involved in developing new park facilities and why it is

important to consult those who will be affected by it. This has enabled them to get more actively involved in the project and contribute their ideas.

The Clifton Crew created a questionnaire which was completed by local residents and young people at the opening event of the LIVIA play area, they have been door knocking with Groundwork, discussed the idea with other local teenagers and attended a design workshop with one of Groundwork's Landscape Architects to design the Multi Use Games Area.

Funding from Environmental Services has also enabled Groundwork to consult with the wider residents around the Green to make sure the facilities developed were ones that local people wanted to see and to ensure any concerns, particularly around crime and antisocial behaviour, were fully considered at the design stage. Residents have received questionnaires and copies of the design for feedback, visits were made to the local Parents and Toddlers Group and Age Concern's day centre to discuss the ideas and a drop in session was held at Clifton Resource Centre for local residents to look at the designs and ask any questions.

Work will start on site after Christmas, but may have to be staged whilst capital funding is secured.
